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#### PLCs aim to standardize learning, assessments

School administration hopes to grant all students an equal learning experience, but some students do not see results.

Professional Learning Communities, or PLCs, are a way for teachers to collaborate with other teachers

who teach the same course to ensure students are being assessed uniformly.

"No student should be given a different assessment that's easier or harder another student,"

administrator Ms. Jessica Hubal said.

At least once a month, teachers meet in order to discuss the curriculum, test dates and rewriting tests and analyzing results to make the course better for students.

"I feel like since we've been doing PLCs, it really makes the team approach to working at DV," math chairperson and teacher Mrs. Christine Marcial said. "You don't feel alone in creating your own materials."

While teachers and administrators feel that PLCs

are helpful, some students feel as if it is not truly being executed to its full potential.

"In the past, I took a class that was important, and I felt behind because all of the other classes were

ahead," senior Noelle Holderith said.

Holderith feels as if classes should be taught similarly because it keeps students taking the same subjects but in different classes on the same page.

Ms. Hubal recalls her personal experience in high

school, saying that even during her time in school, students would discuss the difficulty of the teachers.

"We want to try and eliminate that stigma," Ms. Hubal said. "It's the same course no matter what teacher vou have."

Senior Anna Sickler feels that one of her AP classes was taught differently than the other classes.

"In my class, we would have almost 100 question tests, and then in another teacher's class they would only have 30 question tests," Sickler said. "They would also have a lot of projects and take home tests to boost their grades."

PLCs have the potential to foster communication among teachers within their departments.

"Ms. Fitzkee and I communicate ideas and help each other out," English teacher Mrs. Crystal Wummer said. "The kids only benefit from our collaboration."

#### CTE students compete in SkillsUSA

Building, electrical, automotive and culinary CTE students competed in SkillsUSA last month.

The regional competition was hosted at three separate locations: Johnson College on Dec. 7, Luzerne County Community College on Jan. 9 and Wilkes Barre CTC on Jan. 23.

In individual and team challenges that required them to think on their feet, 15 students competed against 13 other schools in their respective divisions.

Building CTE students were only presented with the finished product and had to be able to use the supplies provided to them to recreate a design closest to that product, with a few twists and turns incorporated.

"Usually they'll throw some things in there you won't need, [but] there is more than one way to skin a cat," Skills USA adviser and building CTE teacher Mr. Keith Fitzpatrick said.

Judges use rubrics to determine scores and look for accurate and precise results.

"They do have a very specific set of plans that

you have to do everything to,"Mr. Fitzpatrick said.

Students who qualified to go to States are as follows: senior Peiper Sivo, first place in culinary arts, junior Johnathan Osborne, first place in cabinet

making and junior Lucas Valentin, first place in plumbing.

"I'm proud of Luke and John. Since we've been

doing skills we haven't had anybody win for either plumbing or cabinet making," Mr. Fitzpatrick said.

Peiper, who competed against seven contestants, had a perfect score of 100, 17 points above second place.

"I was nervous the day before the competition," Peiper said, "but [the day of] I wasn't as much. I was just focused on finishing as soon as possible."

Peiper competed at Luzerne County Community College. Each student was given their own work station and had to make four dishes that were to be judged on plating, proper techniques, taste and proportions.

"I was pretty confident when I saw how all my meals turned out," Peiper said. "I knew I did well but [I] wasn't expecting first place."

States is held in Hershey, Pennsylvania at the Hersey Lodge on April 2, 3 and 4. Mr. Fitzpatrick's goals for the competition are to focus on getting the kids experience.

"They get to see all the best CTC kids from all over the state," Mr. Fitzpatrick said. "It gets them out of [our] kind of bubble."

### Parking passes: expensive, dangerous, inconvenient

While parking passes are overall marketed as a necessity for students who drive to school, they prove to be more of a financial burden rather than a worthwhile investment.

Consider the whopping price of \$50 for an unassigned spot. For students who are already strapped for cash, that's a lot of money to pay for a parking spot when the lot is already overcrowded and inconvenient. Seniors are especially forced to park farther from the doors due to the high amount of juniors who take their spots. This fact overall defeats the purpose of "the senior lot." Why must students pay for a spot that is not promised to them?

Superintendent Dr. Brian Blaum explains that the money from parking passes goes to a general fund that is used to payout a variety of expenses district wide, like maintenance for the parking lot. Some of this money also goes to senior events, but at what cost?

Even while this price overall benefits the senior class and its events, it places a burden on students who may not have the money to pay. Think about the cost of car insurance and gas. Students should not have another financial burden regarding their vehicle.

"I think parking passes are annoying, due to no

assigned parking spots, "junior Tim Jason said. "It puts me out of \$50, which is two gas tanks."

Unlike Delaware Valley, Port Jervis High School provides a more student-friendly approach by not charging any fees for parking on campus. Instead of paying to park, all students need to do is register their vehicle to secure a parking spot.

Many students have voiced that they would be willing to pay for a parking pass if they were given a designated spot in the school's lot or had the opportunity to personalize and paint their parking space. Without these incentives, the cost feels like a waste, especially when the parking lot is overcrowded and the "assigned" spaces are rarely guaranteed or convenient.

Not only is the price of the parking pass outrageous, but the overall concept of the sticker is too. Car stickers are another way in which the wrong person can gain information about you. The parking pass sticker can give clear indication where you attend school, which is overall dangerous for young drivers.

"Even though I paid the ridiculous fee, I haven't put the sticker on my car," senior Claire Marotta said. "I don't like the idea of advertising where I go to school if I am in an unfamiliar area."



#### Corporate greed makes tuberculosis an unnecessar deadly disease

Although tuberculosis (TB) is a curable disease, it killed 1.6 million people in 2021, marking more deaths than malaria and homicide combined. Despite that, only .018% of U.S. deaths are TB-related and up to 7% of all deaths in the Philippines occur from TB. This means that you are 388 times more likely to die of TB in the Philippines than in the U.S. This is because of profit-driven healthcare companies who look to exploit the poorest people in the world to make their shareholders happy.

The company at the heart of the matter is Danaher. In 2010, they created a device that would test for the presence of TB. The device works with a machine and cartridges. They profit off this machine in a printerstyle business model. The machines are sold at a low profit margin, while the cartridges are sold at a high profit margin. This results in some hospitals in high risk areas having a machine but few cartridges.

There are two types of cartridges: one that just scans for TB (MTB/RIF) and another that also determines what drugs would be needed to treat that person (XDR-TB). In 2023 amid public backlash, Danaher agreed to lower the prices of the (MTB/RIF) TB test from \$9.98 to \$7.97. However, Danaher refused to lower the price of the better and more accurate XDR-TB test, despite the fact that there is no evidence that the test costs more to produce. So the current price still sits at an exorbitant \$15 per test. They also agreed to release a third-party audit every year to prove that they are not making a profit on these cartridges. This audit is more than a year late, and the prices remain

stagnant.

We live in a world that chooses to let these people die. When people need essential materials to live, and the systems and organizations in place (to no fault of the supply or the logistics of transport) are lacking those materials, that is us choosing to live in a world in which millions of people die of a curable disease.

"Anywhere you have extreme poverty and no national health insurance, no promise of health care regardless of social standing, that's where you see the sharp limitations of market-based health care," anthropologist and physician Paul Farmer said.

Danaher's money is soaked with the blood of men, women and children who have been taken advantage of just to make Wall Street happy.

#### A financial need-based form of student aid: FAFSA

As college applications begin to close and financial aid packages roll in, other forms of financial support become available to graduating seniors.

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is a financial need-based scholarship form and is open for anyone to apply. The application for the 2025-26 school year opened on Nov. 21. The form must be completed by June 15.


FAFSA is a form filled out by the student and a parent or guardian, that determines the amount of federal student aid received from the U.S. Department of Education. Information required to fill out the application includes, but is not limited to, social security


numbers, tax returns, balances bank accounts and total net worth.

After finished, which normally takes 1-2 days to fill out, it will take between one to three days for the form to be processed. Once the form is received and processed, the student will be able to view their estimated federal student aid.

A student may be able to qualify for a federal pell grant, which is a form of government financial aid which does not require to be paid back.

Students may also receive federal direct loans, which is aid that must be repaid with interest. Most students also may be eligible for a federal work-study. This is a way for students to pay for school through a part-time job while at college.

The financial burden of going to college is often a concern for students who plan on attending, but scholarships are available to those who meet the requirements.

English 12 teachers have given students a packet full of scholarship opportunities.

Ms. Jessica Hubal, the assistant principal for academic affairs, emphasizes the urge to go online and apply for scholarships by the deadline for multiple reasons.

"College is not cheap, I'm sure parents, guardians, friends and past teachers are saying 'Apply for those scholarships," Ms. Hubal said. "You don't want to pay any more than you have to for these college classes."

Although the financial aspect of applying for scholarships is the largest encouragement, the writing process is also very important. Ms.

Hubal encourages students to write an individual essay for each scholarship and to not write a generic essay.

arship forms, deadlines and other

helpful resources students can use.

"Read what the scholarship is about, and then think about a time in your life you can relate to," Ms. Hubal said. "If you're going for engineering, write about engineering."

Although the school provides opportunities to help make the process easier, it is still important to manage your own time properly and to not put everything off until the last minute.

"Set aside the time and do not wait," Ms. Hubal said. "I always know when scholarships are due because the guidance office lines are out the door."

The school website also provides scholarship search sites, which provide a larger access to scholarships to apply for. The webpage updates regularly with new opportunities along with the guidance X account (@ DVHScounselors) and their Instagram (@dvhs counselors).



### 'Nickel Boys' film offers unique cinematic experience

Meeting author Colson Whitehead at Vassar College inspired me as a writer.

I recently had the opportunity to meet Colson Whitehead, the two-time Pulitzer-prize winning author of "The Nickel Boys" and "The Underground Railroad."

I read "The Nickel Boys" over the summer for my AP Literature and Composition class. The story follows an African American youth named Elwood Curtis who is sent to an all-male reform school in the 1960s. There, he encounters the unspeakable horrors of racism, but he also makes friends with Jack Turner, a fellow Black student with a much more pessimistic outlook on society's capacity to change. It is a story that tackles loyalty and abuse, friendship and oppression.

In early November, I was touring Vassar College in Poughkeepsie, New York, and I saw a poster in one of the dorms informing students that Colson Whitehead would be giving a lecture on campus the very next day. As a prolific writer myself, I'm always looking for opportunities to meet other writers—and Whitehead

is the best of the best. The very next day, on Nov. 11, my mom and I returned to Vassar College to hear Whitehead speak. Whitehead delivered a fascinating, and often humorous, account of his life as a writer, from his experience right out of college writing for a New York City newspaper, all the way up to the books he would like to write in the future.

During the Q & A, I got up and explained that I was not a college student, and I told him my English class had recently read "The Nickel Boys." Then, I asked him his thoughts on the book's upcoming movie adaptation. He said he was looking forward to it—he had only seen clips of it at that time—but he was interested in hearing my thoughts on the movie, so he invited me to e-mail him after I saw it.

Three months later, I saw the movie at a theater in Middletown. Like the novel,

the film was brilliant. It stayed true to the plot of the book while also adding its own artistic touch. The camera angles tell the story from a first-person perspective—a creative decision that made me feel as though I myself were experiencing Elwood's life.

Furthermore, in the intimate moments between Elwood and the people close to him, the characters look directly into the camera. The effect is that these characters seem like real people who are devastated by abuse and racism, even as the Civil Rights Movement is gaining ground.

While I highly recommend both the book and the movie, I would advise reading the book first, as it will greatly enhance your understanding of the film.

> Williams and Wilmore have been stuck in space since June 5, 2024 due to failures on their shuttle. The two were supposed to come back Feb. but are now expected to return to Earth by spring of this year.

### Scientists aim to revive wooly mammoths

A de-extinction project has been launched by the Colossal Laboratory that aims to restore the wooly mammoth as a living species using surviving mammoth DNA fused with that of modern elephants.

Colossal has outlined five main goals which could be achieved by the restoration of the Wooly Mammoth:

Proving that the revival of an extinct animal is indeed possible, increasing the resistance of certain areas to climate change, understanding genetic traits in cold-adapted and driving animals, techniques which could contribute to preventing the extinction of elephant species. They also intend to use this project to make advancements in genome editing technology.

The project is broken down into ten

major steps, which will end with the first wooly mammoth calves being born. After gathering enough DNA to work with from both living elephants and the extinct mammals, the scientists will compare them. They will identify important genes

that allowed the wooly mammoth to be adapted to the cold.

> The scientists will then go through a lengthy process to determine what genetic edits can be made and test them. Following that, they will alter an elephant egg's genetic code so that mammoth genetics can be inserted. Finally, a surrogate elephant will receive the altered egg and carry

it in a conservation facility. Unlike other prehistoric species, the last of the wooly mammoths appeared just 4,000 years ago. Additionally, many wooly mammoth specimens have been well preserved in blocks of ice, making it easier to gather their DNA for restoration.

### Monkeys will never type Shakespeare, study finds

In a recent study, two Australian scientists concluded that, given an infinite amount of time, a monkey typing on a typewriter would never type the complete works of Shakespeare.

The study, conducted by professors Stephen Woodcock and Jay Falletta of the University of Technology, Sydney, Australia, challenged the long-held thought experiment known as Infinite Monkey Theorem, which holds that a monkey with infinite time would eventually type Shakespeare because of random chance. They found that the amount of time it would take for a monkey to type Shakespeare is longer than the lifespan of the universe.

Heat Death Theory—the prevailing theory of how the universe will end-holds that in approximately 100 billion years, the

universe will have reached a state of maximum entropy. Put simply, the universe will expand and cool until the temperature throughout is absolute zero, and all life will cease to exist (including monkeys).

Woodcock and Falletta also made a series of calculations based on the global population of chimpanzees—roughly 200,000. If every chimpanzee simultaneously typed on a typewriter for the duration of their lives, the probability that a chimp would type even a short phrase such as, "I chimp, therefore I am" is one in 10 billion billion.

"It is not plausible that, even with improved typing speeds or an increase in chimpanzee populations, monkey labor will ever be a viable tool for developing non-trivial written works," the study found.

#### What's in your drink?: Skittles Drinks

Skittles recently released its own drink in 2024 called Skittles Drinks. These colorful drinks come in four flavors: original, wild berry, sour and tropical. They can be bought online and in person in bulk and individually in stores like Walmart or websites like Amazon.

While different in taste, each flavor has generally the same ingredients and nutritional facts. The only difference between the drinks are the ingredients used for coloring, like Red 40 or Blue 1. The first three ingredients are common, non risk consumables; filtered water, sugar apple juice from concentrate and natural flavors. However, they each contain minimal amounts of acesulfame K, an artificial sweetener that has been linked to an increased risk of cancer and pregnancy complications.

Acesulfame K has potential side effects of disrupting the metabolism, which can affect body weight, blood sugar and appetite regulation. While there are researchers who support these claims with some evidence, The National Cancer Institute has found no evidence of a link to cancer and the FDA declared

it is safe to consume.

The presence of artificial food dyes may also raise concerns over the consumption of the Skittles Drinks. The FDA has been criticized for not evaluating Red 40 in over a decade and the media has begun asking questions regarding the safety of its consumption. Blue 1 currently lacks research of long term effects of its consumption and also may

be recommended to not be consumed.

The serving size for the Skittles Drink is one bottle, 414 mL each. Each drink is 140 calories and contains no fats or cholesterol. They have 10 mg of sodium, 32g of carbohydrates and 32g of sugar. These drinks do not have protein content.

Skittles Drinks may be a fun beverage to try-out but shouldn't be consumed regularly. Like any drink with a high sugar content, it is important to track how much you drink and stick to the serving size. Looking at the ingredient list and confirming you have no allergies to what is in the drink is also a must.



# FDA establishes federal ban on Red 40

Red 40, the synthetic bright red food dye common in dairy products, sweets and beverages, was declared to be banned in the United States on Jan. 15.

Although Red 40 has been approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) since 1971, for decades individuals and scientific studies have reported allergic reactions and hyperactivity in children as

effects on consumption of the dye.

The sole reason that Red 40 is being banned is due to researchers' concerns related to long-term health effects.

These effects may include behavioral changes, asthma, skin irritation and subtle inflammatory responses in the colon and rectum.

Not only has Red 40 affected humans, but studies show effects are prevalent throughout mice. Testing has revealed that the dye may result in the acceleration of immune-system tumors and inflammation

in the distal colon and rectum in mice.

Despite Red 40's ban, other artificial food dyes still remain on the market. Other dyes are being monitored, however, and the FDA conducts regular reviews of studies in the case of potential concerns.

The ban will take time to execute. Though the dye has already been banned in the United States, companies have until Dec. 31, 2027 to remove the dye from their products. Due to this, items that contain Red 40 will not instantly disappear, and

the process will take several years.

While Red 40 ultimately seems harmless, the long term effects raise concerns. The ban ensures that these effects are avoided, which results in the improvement of the public's health.

Dietitian and diabetes educator Caroline Thomason elaborates on the extent of Red 40's effects in USA Today.

"Research is ongoing, and current evidence suggests that it's generally safe in moderation for most people," Thomason said

In their respective divisions, the game day team tied for second out of four teams, while the performance team, with their highest score of the season, placed fifth out of 10 teams.


"[They were] outstanding," head coach Jen Marchetti said. "Both of them were our best performances of the season."
