New scoreboard installed as part of stadium upgrades

A new scoreboard was installed on April 19 inside of Warrior Stadium. The high resolution board from Watchfire has faced multiple delays in its installation but will be used for the rest of the spring sports season, Special Olympics and graduation this year to a variety of events in the future.

Although the same size as the old scoreboard, the new board is completely digital and is one of the highest resolution boards of its kind. It is complete with different templates for sports and has the ability to display multiple videos and graphics.

"Our current scoreboard exceeded its life expectancy by a couple of years. It's limited in what it can do from an

animation standpoint," Dr. Jayson Pope said. "[With] everything from video clips to full-length movies to commercials, we're going to be able to make this a very interactive and engaging experience for people."

The board is part of a series of upgrades for the stadium, including a new sound system and new LED lights, in an effort to have games be as close to collegiate events as possible and enhance every event on the field. During the last football season, administration and those involved in athletics

began trying to enhance fan experience by playing different sound effects throughout the game.

"Coming to events at our stadium for whatever it is, whether a Friday night football game, graduation [or] Special Olympics, I think everybody is hopefully going to be blown away with what they see," Dr. Pope said.

The scoreboard is funded through sponsorships from businesses within the local community. Just as the old board displayed sponsors names across the bottom of it, the new board will display three anchor sponsors on the bottom in LED boxes. Other sponsors will be promoted on the board itself.

"With the exception of our anchor sponsors, we are doing away with the idea of physical signs," Dr. Pope said. "All of our sponsors will be able to advertise digitally. That opens up a whole range of possibilities for companies that want to run seasonal promotions or want to do something a bit more engaging and interactive beyond just

Staff members have been attending training sessions to learn how to operate the board since March. The first phase of training included demo videos of the software, the second phase was webinars with the scoreboard company and the last phase will be occurring in the upcoming weeks with staff being trained on the board itself.

"We have some very talented staff members who are pretty excited about this," Dr. Pope said. "Staff members who have always done the scoreboard are now being trained on the software, and we've had a couple new staff members come out of the woodwork just because they're interested in the project."

Once staff members have become accustomed to the board, the goal is to get students involved in working with the equipment and making content for CTE have already begun creating content to play on the board, promoting a variety of the school's extracurriculars.

According to Dr. Pope, the scoreboard is not only going to bring the community together for events, but the process of getting and installing the board has been a true group effort from starting the plans for getting the board in August of last year until now.

"It's pretty neat to see so many different groups because I think the one thing that people may lose sight of is this is not solely an athletics project," Dr. Pope said. "Yes, it's going to enhance the athletic experience, but the other types of events that we'll be able to hold in our stadium because of the technology we have and the different groups of students who we'll be able to bring into the project extends so far beyond athletics."

FAFSA delays cause harm to students, families, universities

As many college-bound students know, the 2024-25 Free Application for Federal Student Aid has been nothing but a difficult situation. The financial delays are harming students, families and universities.

Unlike years in the past, this year FAFSA opened in December. Historically, FAFSA has opened in October for students to fill out and give schools optimal time to distribute financial aid packages.

This year, however, delays and glitches have created a time crunch for schools to review financial aid ability. Although FAFSA opened in December, many students were blocked from filling out the form until early January.

On Jan. 31, the FAFSA department reached out to schools, notifying them that they would not receive students' financial information until the first half of March. This meant that schools would not be able to start making offers until early April.

Loans, grants and scholarships are all detrimental for students who need assistance financially to afford the

school of their choice. This year's delay has made it nearly impossible for many students to commit to a college, as they do not know the cost of attendance.

Typically, the national decision day for students is May 1, but because of the issues with FAFSA, many schools have extended the deadline. Students are still being put on a time crunch, even with extending the deadline, which creates undeserved anxiety and stress.

These delays and glitches are very telling in what federal programs value.

Attending a four-year university has become a class privilege, one that many cannot afford.

Tuition rates have risen to unmanageable costs, making it hard for almost any student to pay for

college. This, mixed with inconsistent financial aid, makes it difficult for many students to see college as a feasible

oute.

The price of education and the denial of making it more affordable is no coincidence. It is an intentional decision to make sure that the wealthy continue to remain influential.

In the United States, education is a right not a privilege. Action needs to be taken to protect financial assurance so that students can continue learning in today's world.

Maryland recovers from bridge collapse

Since the Francis Scott Key Bridge collapse on March 26, the state of Maryland has been making an effort to recover from this tragic incident. This tragedy sent six out of the eight construction workers to their death as they fell from the bridge into the Patapsco River.

Since then, the whole state of Maryland is making an effort to recover from this tragic incident. The Small Business Administration is offering assistance to those affected by the bridge collapse. Senator Ben Cardin stated that there are currently two channels open to help move traffic into Baltimore, and there will be a third channel added this month.

Shortly after the collapse of the bridge, President Joe Biden ensured that

the federal government will be paying for the new bridge. The cost of the bridge still remains unknown and will depend on the design.

Authorities say that three of the six bodies were recovered, but the search for the others is currently active. The State of Maryland is focused on supporting the families of the six workers who were killed in this tragedy.

There has been a nonstop clean up of debris that has already taken nearly a month to finish. Officials have stated has since been placed in a maximumthat 80-90% of the steel from the bridge is still underwater. Ecuador condemned for storming Mexican embassy

In an attempt to recapture the former Ecuadorian Vice President Jorge Glas who was seeking asylum in Mexico, Ecuadorian police stormed the Mexican embassy in Quito, Ecuador, on April 5.

Glas sought political asylum in Quito following his indictment on corruption charges and resided there from December until the raid. He security prison in Guayaquil, Ecuador.

Mexico stated that they are seeking International Court of Justice and intend on suspending their diplomatic ties with Ecuador following the incident.

According to Honduran President Xiomara Castro, the raid was "an intolerable act for the international community" and a "violation of the sovereignty of the Mexican State and international law."

"The United States condemns any violation of the Vienna Convention on Diplomatic Relations, and takes very seriously the obligation of host countries under international law to respect the inviolability of diplomatic missions,' U.S. State Department spokesperson Matthew Miller said

Gabriela Sommerfield, Ecuadorian Foreign Minister, defended the raid at a news conference on April 6, stating that their actions were justified "in the face of a real risk of imminent escape.

"For Ecuador, no criminal can be considered a politically persecuted person when he has been convicted with an enforceable sentence and with an arrest warrant issued by the judicial authorities," Sommerfield said.

United Kingdom develops first laser weapon

The United Kingdom's defense ministry has developed one of the first functional laser weapons, a powerful close range laser known as DragonFire.

Only costing an estimated 10 pounds per strike (equivalent to \$13) and not requiring ammunition, the technology has the potential to revolutionize air defense. It is extremely accurate, possessing the precision required to hit a target as small as a one pound coin from a kilometer away. Using this technology allows for the ability for targets to be engaged and cut through at the speed of light.

While the exact range of the weapon is classified information, the laser is intended to be used on marine vessels to take down short range aerial targets, though it appears to also possess long range abilities. The technology can not only destroy incoming threats but has the ability to identify, track and deter them. DragonFire is classified as a laser directed energy weapon, or LDEW, the first of its kind in the United Kingdom.

"It's a potential game changer for air defense," the defense ministry said in its video of the laser in action.

In terms of expenses, the UK has likened the cost of 10 seconds of laser power to running a regular heater for just an hour. Though the initial investment required in order to build the weaponry is equivalent

to a hefty sum of \$100 million, added burden of ammunition costs nonexistent, making the weapon a powerful low-cost tool for the long

For comparison, the standard missile-2 used by the United States Navy for similar air defense purposes costs more than \$2 million for just one shot using the current ammunition. Development of the project began to take shape back in 2017, but

the nature of the project, as well as related video content, was only recently declassified and viewable to the public. It was created in response to the growing threat of drone warfare and has been made scalable for the purpose of being equipped on warships in the

While currently considered to still be in a research phase, the weapon is set to become available for

> future deployment in the next five to 10 years. Both the UK Army and Royal Navy are both considering adding the technology to their air defense arsenals when it becomes an option.

archipelago near the coast of Scotland. The UK defense secretary has suggested a potential use to be taking down Russian drones.

Mass stabbing attack leaves six dead, others hospitalized

On April 13, at least six people were stabbed to death in an attack at a shopping mall near Bondi Beach in Sydney, Australia.

New South Wales Police Commissioner Karen Webb identified the suspect as 40-year-old male Joel Cauchi, stating the attack was not terror-related. Police believe the attack to be a woman-targeted event but have no evidence that anyone was specifically targeted.

NSW's Police Commissioner Anthony Cooke revealed that senior police inspector Amy Scott was in the area when the attack began. As she arrived at the scene, the attacker held the knife up to her. Scott shot and killed Cauchi immediately.

Scott attempted CPR on Cuachi until paramedics arrived. The paramedics tried to revive him but were unsuccessful, pronouncing him dead at the scene.

Scott received much praise for her bravery, many

naming her a hero for putting herself in danger to save the lives of others.

Another 12 victims were injured during the stabbing and are being treated in hospitals. Five women and one man were fatally stabbed, one of the women being the mother of the nine-month-old baby who was also injured.

The male victim was identified as 30-year-old Faraz Tahir from Pakistan, who was a security guard at the mall. A written statement from the Ahmadiyya Muslim Community of Australia revealed that Tahir had been in Australia for less than a year and named him as a cherished member of the community.

Cooke released information, stating that Cauchi had been suffering from unspecified lives.

mental health issues, and the investigation would be continuing on for the next few days.

Video footage shows Cauchi running through the mall erratically, while lunging at people and pushing them out of his way. Many shoppers ran out of the mall in panic, while others sought shelter in the stores.

In a written statement released the day after the events, Cauchi's family said they were devastated by their son's actions and that he had been struggling with mental health issues since he was a teenager. They also stated that they had "no issue" with their son being shot by Scott as she was "doing her job to protect others."

After the event, people placed many floral tributes outside the shopping center to honor the victims. The shopping center will remain an active crime scene for days to come

Powerful earthquake hits Taiwan, strongest in 25 years

A 7.4 magnitude earthquake hit the eastern coast of Taiwan and was followed by many powerful aftershocks, on April 3.

The earthquake killed nine people and injured at least 950 people, according to Taiwan's fire department. The earthquake was so strong it destroyed buildings, caused landslides and its impact was felt in parts of China.

The quake struck around 15 miles south of Hualien County, a popular tourist city, at 7:58 a.m. The Central Weather Administration recorded 76 aftershocks in the five hours following the initial earthquake. Hualien's last large earthquake was in 2022 with a magnitude of 6.9

It was reported that almost 1,000 tourists and staff members were stranded in the mountains of Taroko

National Park in Hualien County. Three hikers and one driver died after rockslides in the park. Many people remained trapped in highway tunnels, rock quarries and numerous residential and office buildings.

In the northern part of Taiwan on Guishan Island a small piece of a major tourist destination nicknamed Turtle Island due to its shape, slid into the sea because of the earthquake. In the capital city of Taipei, many citizens were rescued from a partially collapsed warehouse.

Various videos of children being rescued from collapsed residential buildings have been posted to social media. These videos show the rescue efforts of the citizens and Taiwan firefighters.

Residents have been advised by Japan's meteorological agency to continue to urgently evacuate Taiwan until the advisory is lifted.

New Zealand works to power cars by woodchips

Newly manufactured woodchip powered cars have the potential to reduce dependence on Chinese

imported supplies.

During this process, woodchips are transformed into artificial graphite called biographite that can be used to power EV (electric vehicle) batteries.

Since many countries, past and present, depend on China to provide the required components for electric cars, including lithium, iron and phosphate for batteries, it is important for other countries to take control of their independent manufacture of these supplies. China produces more than half of EV batteries produced each year.

Since this way of production has not been largely used, it does seem to raise some concerns. Ivan Williams, CEO of CarbonScape, the company behind this plan, eases concerns by explaining that enough product will be generated annually by 2030 by using less than five percent of the forestry industry in Europe and the U.S. Big ideas come with sacrifice, and Williams realizes that, but he also points out that there would be sustainable and renewable resources being used. Swedish-Finnish forestry firms are also showing support by funding CarbonScape's purpose.

Investments being made currently will help finance sites for future manufacturing in Europe and the US. Because of these strides being taken in New Zealand, CarbonScape is looking to expand to different parts of the world, especially those who heavily depend on China for EV battery materials.

Because of these new innovations, humanity is taking steps towards a more energy efficient future. Advances in technology can create a more sustainable lifestyle when clean energy becomes more available.

TikTok ban remains controversial in Congress

On March 13, the bill to ban TikTok was passed by the House of Representatives in a 252-65 vote. This movement does not mean change is coming as the bill still has to go through a skeptical Senate. It remains unclear if the TikTok ban proposal has enough supporters to pass.

First off, the Senate reportedly has plans to make changes to the House bill before voting on passing the bill altogether. If changes are made, the bill will then have to go back to the House for approval. This lengthy process will significantly delay any possible

The bill passed by the House states that the company that owns TikTok, ByteDance, must sell the app within six months of the ban or the U.S. government will ban TikTok. Some senators propose a change to the bill that will give ByteDance more time to find a buyer, as ByteDance argued that six months was too short of a time period. Other is using TikTok to spy on

make it more difficult to challenge in court and expanding the bill to target other apps.

A handful of legislators are adamant that TikTok must be banned to protect both the U.S. government and American citizens' privacy. Senators Richard Blumental and Marsha

Blackburn jointly said, "As Congress and the administration consider steps to address TikTok's ties to the Chinese government, it is critically important that the American people, especially TikTok users, understand the national security issues at stake."

There are suspicions ByteDance that controlled by the Chinese Communist Party

suggested updates include changing the language to Americans. These accusations have been denied with the company stating that their users' data is not shared with the Chinese government.

> In addition to the ban's questionable level of support, there are several concerns about the legality and effectiveness of banning TikTok. The bill brings

concern about First Amendment violations. Both TikTok and its users would have their speech rights limited with the ban. In order for passage of the bill, the

government will need to prove that the ban is critical to a government interest unrelated to speech and does not significantly infringe upon Americans' speech rights in order to withstand judicial review.

Others claim that the ban is not over concern about Chinese spies but an excuse to force ByteDance to sell the valuable app to American owners.

Energy Research (KIER) developed a new hydrogen production technology involving ammonia gas decomposition without using fossil fuels.

Through using ammonia, which contains hydrogen and nitrogen, it does not emit any sort of carbon unlike petroleum

and gas, it releases carbon gasses into the atmosphere, rampantly furthering global warming. Ammonia also has 1.7 times the amount of hydrogen compared to liquified hydrogen, meaning it is a better method of obtaining.

> The KIER team had used the leftover hydrogen ammonia previous decomposition reactions of ammonia.

The process for getting hydrogen is through decomposition, which is the chemical breakdown of a compound into two or more elements. This process involves heating up the ammonia at around 600 degrees Celsius or 1112 degrees

Fahrenheit using the element Ruthenium.

A gas mixture of hydrogen and nitrogen is formed and can be used as a heat source for ammonia decomposition, but the remaining gas alone cannot give enough heat in order to cause a reaction, meaning extra heat needs to be added.

Drexel researchers test self-heated concrete

Researchers in Drexel University's College of Engineering have been working on producing a self-heating concrete mixture for over five years, and have recently published the data collected. They

aim to create a mixture that can maintain a temperature above freezing, especially during winter months.

"Our work is looking at how we can incorporate special materials in the concrete that help it to maintain a higher surface temperature" -Amir Farnam

Th researchers hope to maintain the temperature of the concrete to help alleviate winter weather expenses for plows, salt and snow blowers. It can also help melt ice to improve traffic safety

"Our work is looking at how we can incorporate special materials in the concrete that help it to maintain a higher surface temperature," leading civil engineer professor Amir Yaghoob Farnam said.

The main component of the concrete

prototype is a lower temperature, liquid form of paraffin. Paraffin is a material that releases heat when decreasing temperatures change its state from a liquid to a solid.

The researchers have created two different mixtures involving paraffin. The first involves treating a light and porous concrete aggregate with the paraffin,

> while the second involves inserting the paraffin into the concrete via microcapsules.

Since December 2021, the researchers have monitored

three different slabs of varying concrete mixtures outdoors. Two slabs composed of the mixtures, while the third is a typical concrete slab being used as a control group.

Data collected shows the first slab being able to maintain a surface temperature above freezing for 10 hours and melt about 2.5 inches of snow. The second can only maintain its temperature for half that time.

Historically, the enthusiasm towards women's sports has been significantly lower than that of men's sports. Over the last decade, there have been increases in popularity but nothing like the advancements seen this basketball season.

Iowa's Caitlin Clark brought an overwhelming amount of attention to women's college basketball when she beat the record for the most points scored in a season for both men's and women's collegiate basketball. This accomplishment drew many eyes to not just Iowa's team but women's basketball as a whole.

"Caitlin Clark in particular has managed to capture the interest and keep it because she's a generational player who is playing the game unlike any other woman that we have seen because of the logo threes," Cindy Brunson, who has been covering

women's basketball for years said. "We've really only seen that in basketball from Steph Curry consistently, and no one has done it in the women's game to this point."

According to Forbes, women's basketball viewership has gone up 60% across major networks since Clark's new found fame. LSU vs. Iowa's championship game last year set records with a peak of 12.6 million viewers. Additionally, 3.39 million viewers, the most viewers a regular season game has seen in 25 years, tuned in to watch Clark take the title as the NCAA Division I's top scorer for both men and women.

Not only have TV views skyrocketed, ticket sales have also

increased significantly. For the first time ever, Iowa's season tickets sold out. Iowa's Carver-Hawkeye Arena seats 15,056 people. The Big 10 women's basketball tournament also sold out for the first time. Two weeks before the tournament started, all 109,000 tickets were gone. Some of the tickets to watch Clark break the scoring record exceeded prices of Super Bowl tickets, with prices going up to \$51,387 on Stubhub.

"I think we're only continuing to show what women are capable of — that we can have amazing sports, that we can entertain, that we can have the viewership, that we can have the support," Brunson said.
