Person of the Year: Miss Jessica Hubal

Known for her positive attitude, willingness to help and genuine personality, Miss Jessica Hubal has undoubtedly left her mark on the students of DV, making her the perfect person to be named Person of the Year for 2024.

Before her time at DV, Miss Hubal attended Susquehanna Community High School. She was a varsity cheerleader, a softball player, a member of Student Council, in Envirothon and helped run blood drives, among other community service events.

After high school, Miss Hubal attended Cabrini University where she double majored in mathematics and secondary education and minored in history. While there, she was the vice president of the Math Club and tutored her fellow students. She then furthered her education at Wilkes University where she earned a master's degree in educational leadership.

Miss Hubal's favorite memory from college was peanut butter and jelly nights in which she and her classmates would bring peanut butter and jelly sandwiches to homeless people in Philadelphia.

She began working at DV in October of 2014. Miss Hubal was originally looking for a job near where she lived, but when she saw a posting for a math position at DV, she decided to go for it. When she got to the interview, however, she learned that the position was for a computer science and engineering teacher. She was first offered a long-term substitute position before getting the position she applied for; however, she had no computer science experience. Miss Hubal taught herself two coding languages over the weekend and would then spend hours each night figuring out how to teach the lesson for the next day.

I really learned from that experience," Miss Hubal said. "I don't think I would have been as successful if I wasn't forced to do it, and it really opened my eyes to computer science and my love for it."

Miss Hubal's favorite part of teaching is interacting with the students and seeing them develop into better versions of themselves.

"I love to learn from the students and know what they're doing with their lives, and my goal is to help them succeed when they leave here," Miss Hubal said. "My mindset is growth and learning. I'm a lifelong learner, and I want my students to be that as well."

This year, Miss Hubal switched from being a full-time teacher to solely teaching AP Research and being appointed as the Assistant Principal for Academic Affairs. With this role, she investigates plagiarism, AI, cheating and grading issues on assignments and assessments, does observations and walkthroughs and works on recommendations and scheduling. On top of that, in teaching AP Research, she helps 12 students with their unique, extensive projects in proofreading their papers, helping with presentations and helping the students get the equipment they need for the projects.

"I really like it. I'm always on the go," Miss Hubal said. "I think I've grown a lot this year, and I now know where to put my focus and what things can be on the back burner."

Miss Hubal's biggest influences in her personal life are her parents who she considers her best friends.

"My dad had his own business. He instilled hard work, and I get my personality [from him]," Miss Hubal said. "My mom always instilled academics in not only myself but my sisters, so all of us have [at least] a master's degree."

To Miss Hubal, DV stands out from other schools in the area because of its wide range of offerings from

sports to academics. As someone who had no APs offered at her school, she thinks it is amazing that DV offers 33.

"For high school and when you look even at the districts in the area, they don't even compare to what our course offerings are, and I think that betters our students," Miss Hubal said. "It makes them more marketable when they leave here, regardless of if they're going into the workforce, the services or college."

Miss Hubal's hope as a teacher is to make sure her students grow and to instill a positive attitude in them.

"Miss Hubal is every part of what a student wants and needs from their teacher," senior Christian Perunsky said. "She leads by example, so everyone who knows her can appreciate and learn from her how to be serious and passionate about their work, while enjoying it."

Miss Hubal's advice for students is "continue to reach your goals. Set goals, even if they're small goals. If you have hard work and determination, you can do it."

made with her colleagues.

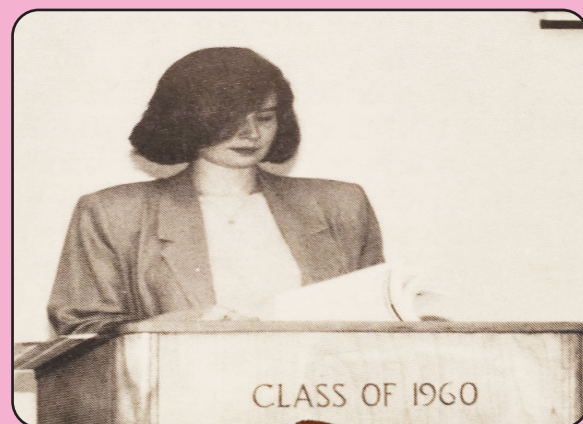
"Señor Cotroneo is like my brother from another mother, and Mr. Bates is like my work son," she said. "We were kids when we got here."

Personnel of the Year: Mr. Ricky Rosario

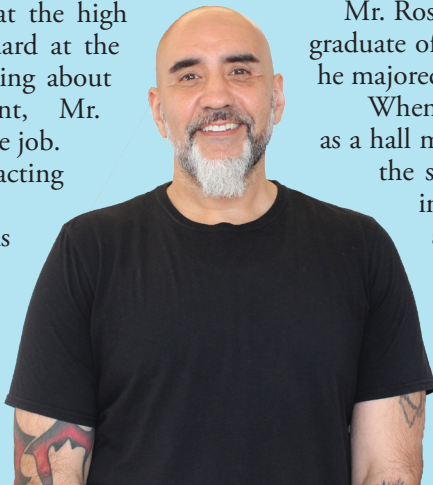

It's surreal to be in high school with my brother and to be leaving high school with my sister. It's definitely a perk to have your siblings by your side all four years of your high school career. It was something

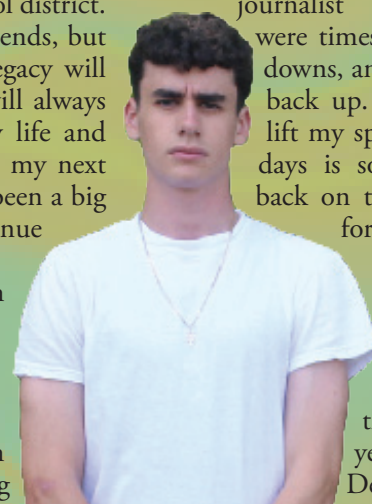
that I did not take for granted. I will be rejoining my brother next year at Marywood, which I'm definitely looking forward to.

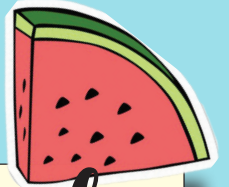

Jacob was involved in football, lacrosse, Science Olympiad and National Honor Society.

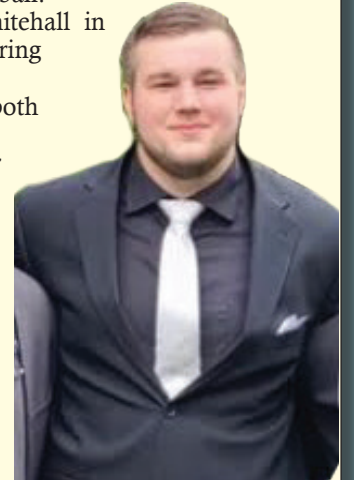
"They've taught me a lot about where I want to take my life and what I want to do for the future," Jacob said. "DV nurtured my academics to college level and helped me find somewhere to play football."

During his time at the high school, Ben participated in track, cross country and Odyssey of the Mind. These choices shaped his experience and ultimately influenced his college decision.

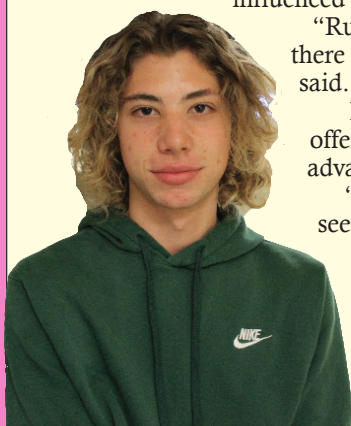
"Running cross country here helped me realize that there [are] opportunities in college to do that," Ben said.

Many teachers have impacted Everett in high school, but one that stands out to him the most is Mr. Pol.

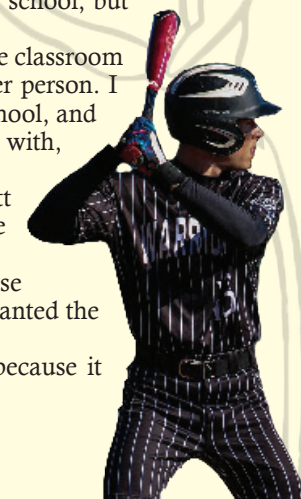

Being at DV has taught him how to work hard, communicate and make friends. Tyler will miss his friends and encouraging teachers the most.

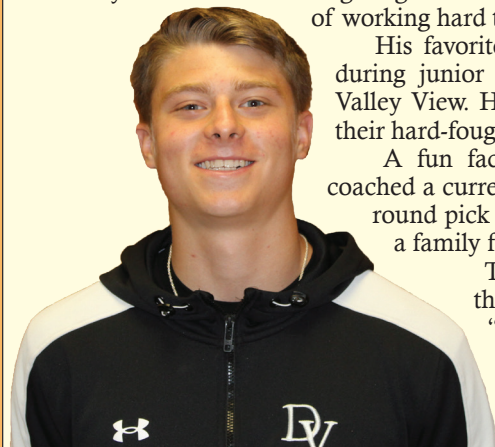

His advice for underclassmen is to "be who you want to be and not care what others think."

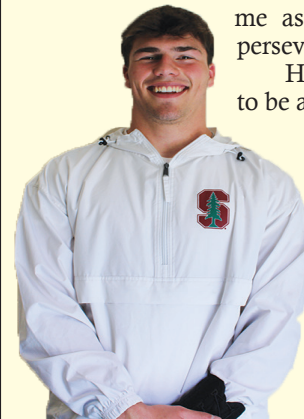
Aiden also thanks his parents and grandparents for always being there for him.

Her favorite parts of high school were volunteering with NAHS and having a table at the senior art show.

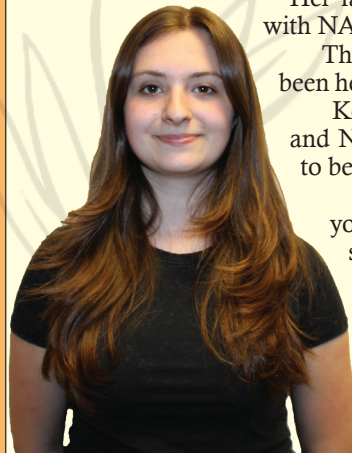
Throughout her life, her biggest role model has been her family for how supportive and caring they are.

"Marching band made me love music even more," Nikos said. "Unified track had a big impact on me."

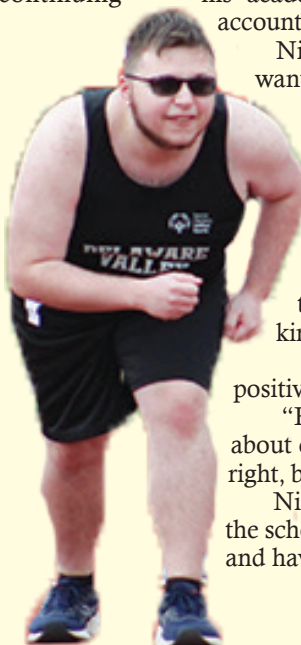
Miss Ripa was Nikos' favorite teacher throughout high school because she was always kind and caring towards her students.

"Dance has helped me find a passion and purpose and gave me an escape," Sophia said.

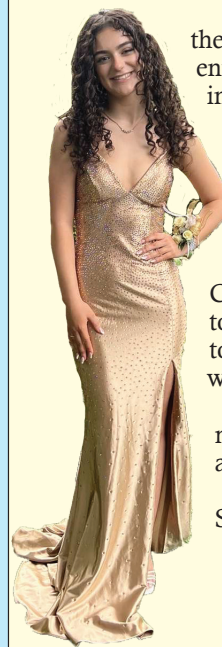

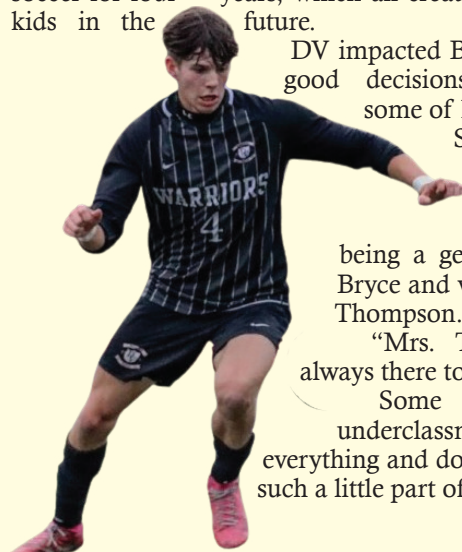

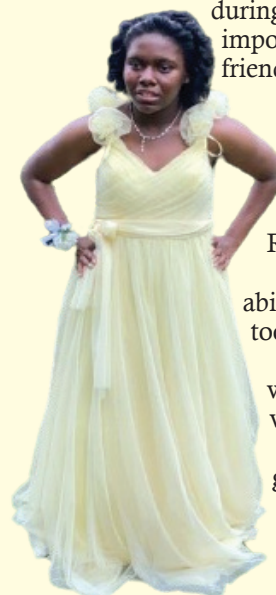
She also attended many of her siblings' sporting events and helped her mom out in the cafeteria. These activities improved her social skills and helped her to be more recognized in society.

Catherine Ficken is best known at Delaware Valley for her striking personality. After high school, Catherine plans on attending East Carolina University to major in biology.

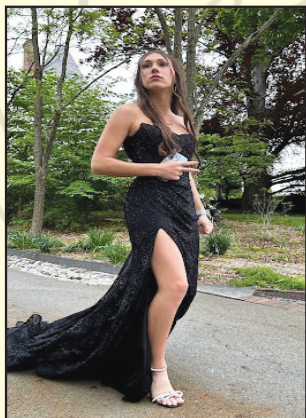
Throughout high school, she was a member of the soccer team, track and field team and SAAC. These clubs and activities helped Catherine meet some of her best friends.

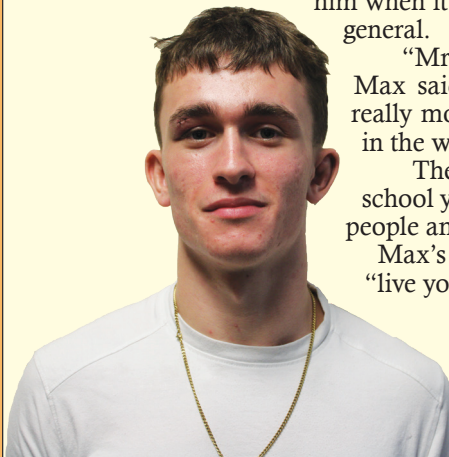
Throughout high school, Max has been involved in the wrestling program. He enjoyed making new friends on the team and making memories with his teammates and his coaches during his time on the team.

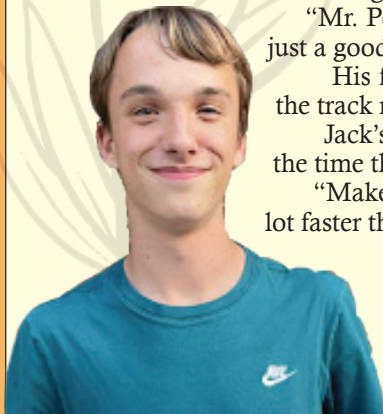

"She's an amazing foods teacher and overall a great person," Sam said.

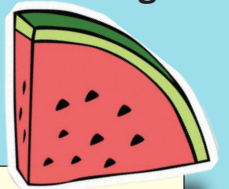

DV has given Lawson multiple opportunities and chances for success in high school.

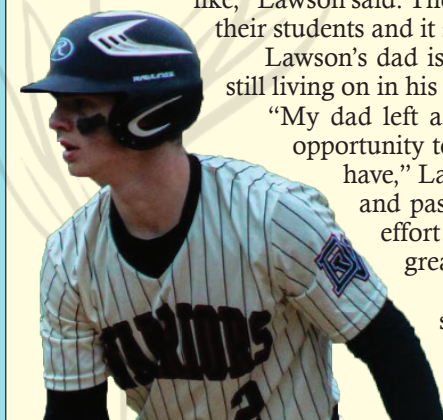

"He has helped me get through most things in my life and shaped me to be the person I am today," Dan said.

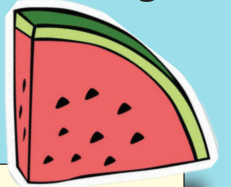

As high school comes to an end, Tommy will miss his friends and the nights out with the boys.

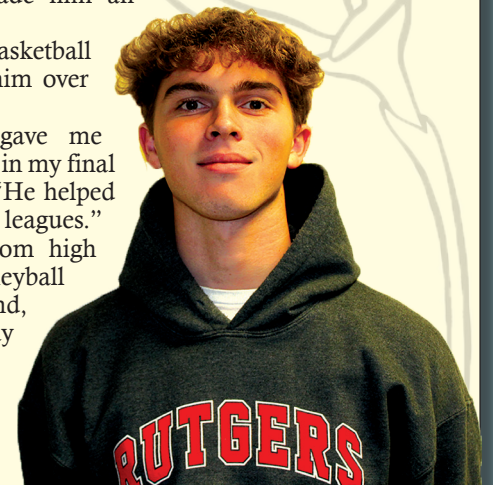
He believes that DV has made him an overall better person.

"They taught me to be really good at time management, be a good leader and have a good work ethic," Christian said.

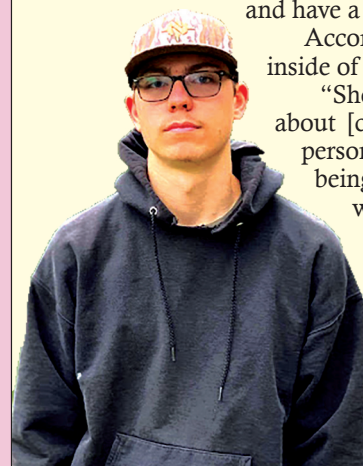
According to Christian, his biggest inspirations inside of the school are Miss Hubal and coach Quinn.

Over the past couple of years, Noah has been involved in football, wrestling and track. He gives DV credit for making him an overall better person.

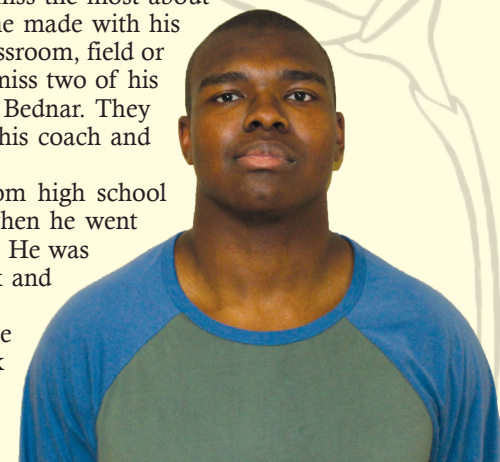
"DV has helped me learn how to express myself in many ways, from my conversations with friends, teachers and opponents," Noah said.

Jayden will miss his friends the most along with the people who kept him entertained during the school day.

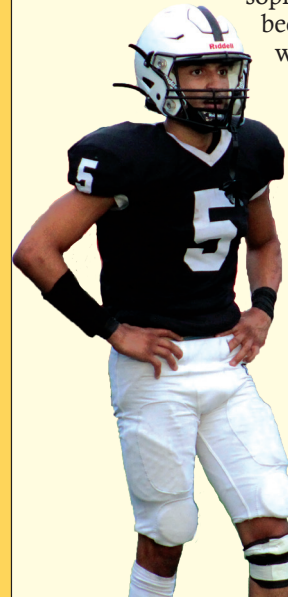
The teacher who left the biggest impact on Jayden is Mrs. Propst.

"We are young and are focused on school work, as well as everything outside of school," Michael said. "Now, we are going into the next chapter of our lives as college prepares us for the future."

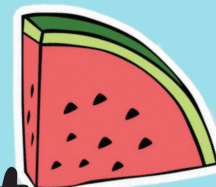

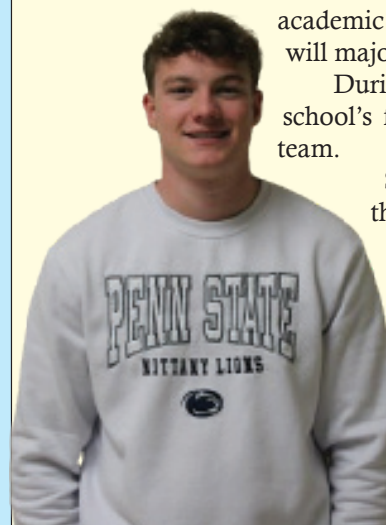
After high school, Sam plans to continue his academic career at Bloomsburg University where he will major in digital forensics and cyber security.

Chris will not only miss his friends, he will also miss the teacher that impacted him the most, Ms. Hill.

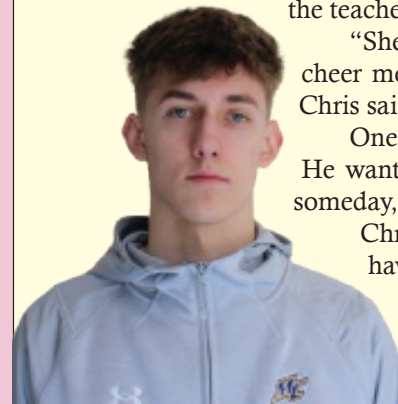
"She was always someone I could count on to cheer me up or give me advice and reassurance," Chris said.

During high school, Kiley spent the majority of her time on school work and at her job.

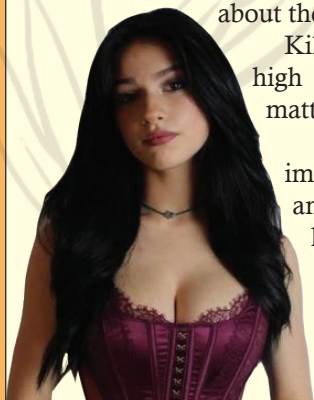
"Between working to get good grades and having two jobs, I've learned responsibility and time management skills," Kiley said. "I've learned a lot about the real world and hard work."

Looking back at her years at DV, Scarlett recognizes teachers Mrs. Kaylor and Mrs. Wummer as helpful and prominent figures in her life.

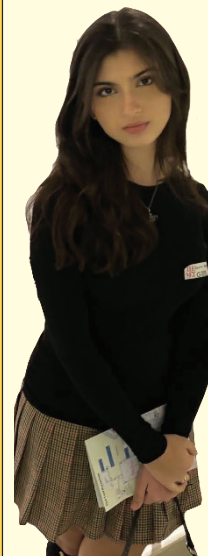

Scarlett has won several awards for her art but most notably are that she won a Scholastic Gold Key three times and won second place in the Congressional Art Competition.

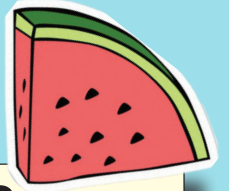

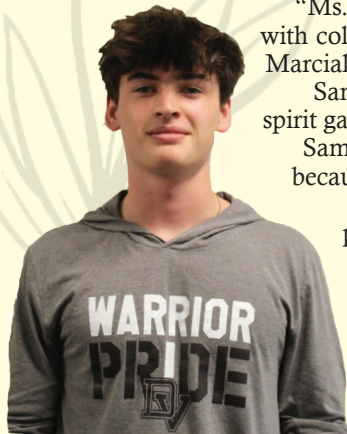
"Ms. Hubal taught me how to code and helped me with college and my career choices," Sam said. "Mrs. Marcial was a good teacher, and I enjoyed her class."
