

also enjoys spending time with her friend Mrs. Beth Pavinich.



Before the lacrosse season even begins, coach Krasulski arrives at school before 7 a.m. everyday to plan out tryouts, practices and other preparations for the spring.



After Dr. Thomas Finan initiated a boys lacrosse program in the school, he became the assistant coach for lacrosse for the first year before becoming head coach from the second year on. He still continues coaching middle school football in addition to lacrosse.



He is extremely proud of the team this year, saying that they are the "best team he's had," averaging 18 goals

a game. However, the most rewarding feeling in coaching lacrosse for coach Krasulski is watching each individual player grow into a better person.

"I've known most of the boys since they were in elementary school and some of them from camp when they were kindergarteners. my chorus classmates.



In high school, David has been involved in baseball and Weightlifting Club. By being involved in these activities he has gained more friends.


“It [DV] has made me learn how to work in a good environment and socialize with my peers,” David said.

Dylan plans to attend Sussex Community College in New Jersey in the fall majoring in business administration.


Throughout high school, Dylan has been a part of the football team as a linebacker for all four years.

Jake made sure to enjoy his high school years and make the most memories he could not only in school, but also in the classroom, in his sports and outside of school with his friends.


The memory he will always carry with him is the Florida trip with the football team.

Being part of this program helped him decide that he wants to continue his career in this field.


"I will miss the environment and seeing friends everyday," Joseph said. "You don't have that many responsibilities. You have it easy now."


JESUS CUEVAS



His band is called Acid Angel, and Charles performs on both the drums and vocals. Currently, the band played at multiple venues in the tri-state area and participated in a battle of the bands.


Mrs. Chromey and Mr. Llewellyn are two teachers Charles praises for always encouraging him.

Throughout high school Wyatt was involved in weightlifting freshman year. He joined the Electrical CTE program his sophomore and junior years.



Zac said some of the most memorable people and events in high school were with his coaches and when he won the state championship for wrestling.


Zac said that sports and school have affected him positively and have prepared him for his future. He will carry many of the stories and lessons that he has learned throughout life.


KEEGAN KAUFMANN






Throughout high school, Michael has become connected with students and faculty because of his outgoing personality.

"I appreciate the opportunities here. Being able to participate and be involved gave me a path that showed me what I want to do," he said.



Oakley plans on attending Eastern University to double major in marketing and communications. She accredits the different classes at DV for making her want to pursue a career in this area.


"I gravitated towards the business classes, and the teachers in the department molded my perception on the topic and helped me want to pursue it for a career," Oakley said.


"Mrs. Shatt got me through 11th grade English and somehow made reading Macbeth in class fun," Brady said.

"She has helped me so much in my college selection process. I would not be majoring in what I am today without her," Lajhia said.


Another role model of Lajhia is Mr. Marcial.

Armand found a love for track, which he will miss the most when he leaves high school. Armand found guidance from teachers along the way through school. Dr. I was a mentor for him.


Armand's father played a good role in his life, helping him through the tough times.

Over his four years here, Shawn has played lacrosse and become a member of the National Honor Society.


"Lacrosse helped me get recognized by Felician and get my scholarship," Shawn said.



“It [Combo 11] was definitely the most engaged I was during high school,” Max said. “It was very interactive and it encouraged a lot of participation.”


The teacher that impacted him the most was his English teacher Mrs. Lordi who he had multiple classes with.




"[These teachers] have taught me life lessons about how to be successful, and they were the realest ones," he said.

"They have been influential for my years of high school because they have helped me find goals for the future," he said.


Tony will miss the meaningful relationships he gained with Mrs. Fitzkee and Adam Berlin during lunch.
