Administrative Retreat – The high school administration team participated in an administrative retreat at Sky Top Lodge on July 28th & 29th. The retreat provided information pertaining to districtwide testing, the evaluation process, effective discipline strategies, and state and federal programs. The retreat was used to unite the school and administrative team under the slogan of 1DV.

Freshman Orientation- On August 22nd, the Delaware Valley High School held another successful Freshman Orientation for all incoming 9th grade students and new students to the district. Students received information on their schedules, map of the school, locker information, club and sport information, and participated in a scavenger hunt. The scavenger hunt was a fun and interactive experience for the students that allowed them to become familiar with the building and their individual schedule.



Class Meetings- On August 30^{th,} students in grades 9-12 attended their annual class meeting. The class meeting reviewed procedures and policies of the Delaware Valley High School. The review of student expectations will set students up for success and make their school year as enjoyable as possible.

High School Administrative Team- The high school administrative team had numerous changes this year. The month of August was very productive in preparing us for the upcoming school year.

Harrisburg Football Game (Back to School Night)/Student Mascot Visits to the Elementary School- In conjunction with the 1DV initiative, the Student Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) and Student Council helped promote the first home football game against Harrisburg in the elementary and middle schools. Representatives from SAAC, student council, and the Warrior Mascot made building visits to promote attendance at the game. All students K-8 received free tickets to the football game.





Open House- The high school hosted an open house on September 5th. During this time, parents followed their child's schedule to visit and meet with their child's teachers. The teachers presented and highlighted classroom content and expectations. Parents were able to ask questions about course work and classroom procedures. The counseling department also put on a presentation to highlight the counseling supports and services that are provided throughout the school year.



Dr. Mauro/CTE Visit- On September 5th, Dr. Mauro visited with our CTE teachers, both individually and as a group. Dr. Mauro was a presenter and trainer last school year for our CTE staff. This year, he had the opportunity to speak with the CTE teachers in reference to their program needs. Dr. Mauro facilitated a two-day training course this fall with our CTE staff. Dr. Mauro discussed last year's recommendations for the CTE teachers and gathered ideas to help him plan for his fall training.



Club Fair- On September 15th, the high school held its annual club fair for students during all lunches. Advisors and club members set up table displays to highlight their club accolades and recruit new members. The tables were set up in the hallway between the two cafeterias. All students were given the opportunity to attend the club fair and see the various co-curricular offerings provided at Delaware Valley High School.





Spirit Week- Spirit week at the high school was held from September 25th through September 29th. This week is intended to promote school spirit before Warrior Fest and Homecoming activities. Each day during the week had a different theme. Spirit Week participation was tallied and reported during homeroom to earn a point for the upcoming Spirt Game competition. The outcome of spirit week competition awarded a point for the Freshman and Junior classes.









Fall Spirit Games- On September 29th, the high school held its annual fall Spirit Game Competition. The Freshman and Sophomore classes competed in the Freshmen Gym while the Junior and Senior classes competed in the High School Gym. There were approximately ten games for students to participate in, including a half-court shot, dizzy bat, table relays, hula-hoop relays etc. between the grade's levels. In addition, our chorus opened the "ceremonies" with the singing of the DV Alma Mater. The students were also treated to performances by our marching band and cheerleading squad. Our students and staff had a great time with sophomores and seniors claiming victory!





Warrior Fest- During the homecoming field hockey game and prior to the homecoming football game, our sports teams and clubs had tables set up providing food and games for our students and community members.







Homecoming Football Game- Our football team defeated North Pocono 42-0. Our Homecoming Court was introduced, and the Homecoming King and Queens were

crowned at half time of the game.







Homecoming Dance- Our homecoming dance was a huge success with 834 students attending. The students had a blast, and we appreciated the help from many of our staff members.







Powderpuff Game- On October 4th, our junior girls played our senior girls in a flag football game. The senior girls were victorious 34-20. Our junior football players coached the junior girls during the game while our senior football players coached the senior girls. All the students that participated had a great time. We appreciated the help from our staff once again, and there were a group of approximately 50 families in attendance.





Financial Aid Night- On October 4th, our guidance department organized a financial aid night for our senior parents. This night provided parents with information and guidance pertaining to various sources of financial aid and the FAFSA process.



College Fair- On October 6th, 40 college representatives were in the high school gym. During 1st-4th periods, our juniors and seniors were scheduled time slots to go and talk to colleges of potential interest. The fair was organized by guidance counselor Crystal Ross.





Start with Hello Week (9/18-9/22)- Start with Hello Week is a call-to-action for schools and students to start the school year with kindness, inclusiveness, and creating positive connections with others. Name tags were handed out to make it easier for students to get to know each other and facilitate conversation between students.



Cross Country Records- Junior Michael Donlon broke the school's 5K record, previously held by 2021 graduate Adam Kanterman, with a time of 16:41. In addition, with a time of 18:01, senior Ryan O'Connor shattered her own previously held 5K school record of 19:36 and the previous course record, set by Scranton Prep's Erin Feeney in 2014 of 18:52.



Student-Selected Staff Members of the Month- This school year we started a process in which students can nominate a staff member for "Staff Member of the Month." The students filled out a nomination form explaining by their staff member should be recognized. In September, 57 staff members were nominated by students. A total of 155 ballots were received. The messages students left for staff members were amazing. All these ballots were given to teachers to show them what they mean to their students and the difference that they make every day in students' lives.



SAT at DV- On October 6 our guidance department organized and proctored our first ever online SAT exam.



PSAT Testing- On October 11th and 18th our sophomores and juniors took their PSAT. This was the first time the PSAT was taking digital. Guidance counselors worked with students, staff, and families to assure all students were prepared. Teachers facilitated a readiness check for students prior to testing. Guidance counselors assured all students were prepared with charged Chromebooks.



Security Drill- On October 20th, we performed our first security drill for the school year. The drill included teachers and students barricading the classroom door with any items they had available in the classroom. The teachers spoke to students about actions to be taken in the event of a school intruder being in the building.



Women's Empowerment- Peace studies teacher, Tyler Barnett, hosted a women's empowerment panel of inspiring women for students in his classes. Students asked those on the panel pre-written questions about women's activism and their roles in their community.



Unity Week/Hat Parade- October 16th-20th was Unity Week, which is dedicated to spreading kindness and to stop bullying. October 18, students and staff wore orange in support against bullying. October 19 students and staff had the opportunity to participate in a hat parade (support for cancer patients as well as raising money for hats to be shipped to patients). As a school we partnered up with a nonprofit organization called the **Heavenly Hats Foundation**. Students and staff had the ability to pay \$1 dollar to be able to wear hats in honor of individuals battling cancer. As a school we raised over \$300. The proceeds were donated to offset the cost of shipping new hats to

all the patients and hospitals around the United States. All the hat packages are donated free of charge to the patients and hospitals. October 20 was black and white Friday to show that DV stands together against bullying.



National Art Honor Society Induction- The National Art Honor Society induction was held October 25th at Forester's Hall in Milford. Thirteen new members were inducted in front of their friends and families. They served refreshments and snacks to all that were inducted as well as their families.



Trunk or Treat- On October 25th, the DVHS Class of 2024 hosted a Trunk or Treat for all elementary students in the district. The turnout was fantastic! Eighteen clubs and organizations for DVHS hosted trunks and hundreds of students participated. This event is quickly becoming a favorite community service project among both students, staff, and the community.







Student Leadership Workshop- On October 25th & 26th, all FBLA officers attended the State Leadership Workshop at Kalahari. The officers attended various workshops to learn more about the various FBLA events and how to grow personally as leaders in the business world.

Dingmans Delaware Primary School Visit- On October 27th, our September Students of the Month and school Mascot went to the DDPS to participate in their positive behavior assembly.





Halloween Dress-Up- On October 31st, all seniors were permitted to participate in a costume dress up day as a senior privilege. All students participated and had a great day.







Day of the Dead Celebration- On November 2nd, Senor Cotroneo's AP Spanish class and Ms. Propst's Gourmet Foods class had a day of the dead festival to recognize the cultural differences between the Day of the Dead in Mexico and All Souls Day in the US. They had different foods and the Spanish class presented altars for a lost loved one.







National Honor Society Induction- On November 6th, the NHS had their induction ceremony for upcoming members. The executive board members made speeches about the four pillars: scholarship, service, leadership, and character.



National Fall Leadership Conference (**NFLC**)- On November 10th & 11th, two FBLA officers attended the NFLC in Providence, Rhode Island. At the conference, the officers attended workshops to teach them valuable leadership skills and how to better lead their chapter towards success this year. Parent Teacher Conferences- On November 19th, parents had the opportunity to schedule a conference with their child's teachers to discuss performance in the classroom. The conferences were held from 12:30 pm-3:30 pm on Zoom and then in person from 4:30 pm-7:30 pm.



Champions Parade- To increase student attendance for the football team's state quarterfinal game and to recognize the achievements of the fall athletes, DVHS held a Parade of Champions on November 22nd. The Marching Band led the parade followed by the Fall Champions which included Girl's Soccer, Girl's Volleyball, Boy's Cross Country with individual recognition for Cross Country athletes, cheerleaders, and concluded with the Football Team to promote ticket sales for their upcoming game that

Saturday. The parade made its way through the hallways of the high school and middle school.







Thanksgiving Food Drive- Student Council's Annual Thanksgiving Food Drive was a definite success! Warrior Nation collected over 2,200 nonperishable items to donate to our local families in need. Representatives from both Milford's Ecumenical Food Pantry and Dingman's Holy Trinity food pantry expressed their gratitude for our donations which will help to feed so many families over the holiday season. A special thank you went out to Mr. Murray's homeroom for collecting 424 items, as well as Mrs. Lordi's & Dr. Cosentino's homeroom for collecting 317 items. Both classes enjoyed a Student Council sponsored breakfast for their effort.



Crafternoon - The National Art Honor Society held a Christmas Crafternoon fundraiser on December 2nd for elementary school age children of Delaware Valley educators and administrators. The children watched a movie, decorated cookies, and drank hot chocolate. The children then created photo ornaments, Christmas cards and gift bags for their parents.

The LEO team beat the students 66-46. \$175 was raised for Toys for Kids and many toys were collected. All toys and money benefited families in our local area.

FBLA Regionals- Took place in Scranton and the High School had 53 FBLA members qualified for the state leadership conference which took place on January 11th. The members qualified by taking the top three in their events. Sophomores Vidhi Patel and Ava Troup were elected as regional officers for the next school year.



Keystone Exams- Students took the statewide Keystone exams January 10th-11th. We look forward to our results to see our success and utilize the data to continue to grow our students and school.

District Band- The following students Owen Carso, Charlie McClain, Nev Rhein, Abby Zimmerman and Grace Stevens qualified for District Band and participated in the festival that took place at Exeter High School on January 11th-13th. The festival was a three-day event in which all participants qualified for PMEA Region V Band in February.



Teacher In-Service Days- January 2nd and 15th were student holidays; however, our staff members were in the building attending training sessions. Between the two days, we had a total of 75 training courses to meet our staff interests/needs. The January 2nd training courses were focused and state mandates, while the training on the 15th training provided professional learning opportunities selected from the results of staff surveys.



Tri-State Cheer Competition- On January 14th, the cheerleaders hosted the 23rd annual Tri-State Cheer Challenge at Delaware Valley. Over 30 local youth and high school teams competed with the Grand Champion award going to Minisink Valley Varsity. The DV cheer teams worked the event and performed their routines as an exhibition to raise money to attend the National High School Cheerleading Championships in Orlando in February.



AP Fair - An AP Fair was held on January 17th during all lunches in the Multi-Purpose Room. Students were able to learn more about each of the AP courses that DV offers prior to the start of the scheduling process. Many AP teachers and student representatives were there to help promote courses and answer questions.







DV Drama- DV Drama produced two, one-act plays on January 21st and 22nd, one of which was A Deal with Death written by student Owen Carso. Owen turned his popular book into a play which drew a large student audience to the shows. In addition, the DV

stage was turned into a post-apocalyptic scene with our production of 10 Ways to Survive the Zombie Apocalypse by Don Zolidis. The shows created performance opportunities for 30 student actors with different levels of experience and gave our technical theater students an opportunity to create original sound and lighting designs. DV Drama is proud to continue providing kids with enriching experiences!



Blood Drive- On January 24th, DVHS hosted the American Red Cross Blood Drive. The goal set by the American Red Cross was for 68 registered donors and 43 pints of blood collected. To help meet this goal and in attempts to recruit new first time donors HOSA students were asked to apply to be blood program leaders. Two seniors and two juniors were selected to lead the drive and recruitment process. They arranged for posters to be hung around school, they visited homeroom classes and were visible during lunches to promote the drive, answer questions and encourage nervous first-time donors. Despite best efforts, possibly related to snow days leading up to the drive, not all donation appointments were filled. On the day of the drive, only 5 of the 8 scheduled Red Cross employees arrived for our drive. Several students brought permission slips to the New Gym excited to donate but unfortunately had to be turned away due to staffing and timing of the drive. The drive was shortened by the Red Cross to 5 hours instead of 6, which excluded several of our usual afternoon donors. We ended the day just shy of our goal with 41 pints of blood collected. Of the 49 registered donors, 32 were student donors and more specifically 12 were first time donors.





The HOSA students play a crucial role in the ongoing success of the blood drive. In addition to their hard work recruiting and planning the drive, they staff the drive by working the registration and canteen tables. They monitor donors after the donation process and alert staff to possible adverse donation reactions. Blood and blood products cannot be manufactured or made in a lab. It must come from contributions from volunteer donors. High schools are a perfect place to host blood drives, educate students about the importance and impact blood donation can have on the lives of many

and turn them into lifelong donors. Donating alongside peers and staff members provides a sense of comfort and can truly be an enjoyable experience.



Without everyone's support this successful drive would not have been possible and run as smoothly as it did. We are looking forward to this continued partnership with the American Red Cross to continue to make a lasting impact on families in our community.

Comprehensive Local Needs Assessment- Administration, CTE teachers, and OAC members met in the Warrior Café on January 25th. During this meeting, the program's needs were discussed, outside businesses were informed of the state's requirements, and Perkins' requirements were reviewed. Additionally, the Warrior Café students served dinner to the attendees of the meeting. During the dinner, there were discussions about how we can continue to improve, grow, and meet our students' needs.



Leadership Academy- DVHS partnered with Mrs. Smith, representative for 4H Youth Development through Penn State Extension, to hold our 2nd Leadership Academy on January 30th. There were 14 students who took the opportunity to spend the day with Mrs. Smith to participate in a day of activities that focused on Leadership, Service Learning, Growth Mindset, GRIT, Civil Discourse, Advocacy, and Effective Communication



Delaware Broadcasts- Earlier this school year, the journalism club received a grant to purchase podcast and broadcast equipment. With this equipment, our students have been broadcasting and recording our sporting events (mainly basketball). These broadcasts will continue to grow and develop throughout the year.



Special Olympic Skiing- In January, our students were involved in our special Olympic skiing program. Our National Honor Society members also go on these trips and assist our special needs students.









Got Sneakers- Throughout the month of February, the senior class collected used and/or old sneakers to raise money for the class. The shoes go to an organization called GOT sneakers and distributes shoes to people in need across the country and overseas. The public has also been eligible to drop off sneakers to contribute to the cause. The collection ended March 15th.



Freshman Parent Night- On February 6th, current 8th grade families had an opportunity to attend a parent night with information pertaining to the high school, course offerings, and opportunities that students will have when they enter the high school in the 2024-2025 school year.

NCAA Clearinghouse Parent Information- On February 6th, Dr. Cosentino and Mr. DeLauro provided information pertaining to the requirements that the NCAA holds for Students wishing to participate in college athletics. This night was open to parents and students of Middle Schoolers and High Schoolers.



Midyear Class Meetings- Midyear class meetings were held for each grade on February 6th and February 12th. Midyear meetings are to remind students of important upcoming events and opportunities, as well as review expectations. For juniors and seniors, state troopers also came in and explained road safety laws and what to do if stopped by a law enforcement officer.

CTE Tours- Freshman students had the opportunity to tour a CTE program of their interest on February 7th. During this time, they were able to speak with current students and the teachers to learn about the program and see if it is a program they would be interested in participating in.









PMEA District 10 Orchestra Festival- Four DVHS students, Eric Choi, Soren Allen, Grace Stevens, and Charlie McClain, attended the PMEA District 10 Orchestra Festival at Northeast Middle School in Bethlehem on February 8th-10th. They performed a spectacular concert, with sophomore Grace Stevens playing a piccolo solo. Charlie qualified for the next level, Northeast Region Orchestra, which took place in March.

FBLA CTE Celebration- Throughout February, FBLA was involved in the CTE celebration portion of their champion chapter requirements. Senior Mackenzie Donald, who serves as PA FBLA state president, recently presented at the Department of Education dinner and spoke about the importance of CTE. CTEs are heavily impactful in FBLA as they equip FBLA members and all students in the program with what they need to be successful in post-secondary education, the workforce, and beyond. In turn, FBLA can provide CTE students with the opportunity to refine their skills in collaboration, problem solving, and critical thinking while providing service within our communities.

This collaboration benefits the ECE and HCC students by showing preschoolers that medical visits may not be as scary as they think and our future healthcare professionals by interacting with young patients. HCC and ECE plan on continuing this yearly during February each year.

Security Drill- On February 26th, the high school had a classroom door barricade drill. During this drill the teachers barricaded the classroom door with items they have in their room. All students also move away from the door and windows. The teachers also speak to students about an emergency in which this drill needs to take place.

Odyssey of the Minds at Regionals- Congratulations to all four DVHS OM teams for their successes at the NEPA Odyssey of the Mind Regional Tournament on February 24th at the Pocono Mountain West High School. Our Vehicle, Structure, and Performance teams each came in First Place and our Technical team came in Second Place. All four teams advanced to the State Finals competition held on April 6th at Pocono Mountain East High School.



Senior Tea- The Class of 2024 hosted a "Senior Tea" on February 29th during 7th period to award class superlatives. 8th **Grade AP Recruitment -** Before the scheduling process started, several of our senior AP scholars presented to honors middle school students to help them learn more about AP courses and offerings. These AP scholars shared their experiences and passion for learning to promote the two available freshmen level AP courses. In addition, middle school students were able to learn more about the Freshmen Boot Camp summer offering that will help them make the transition to high school easier.



ASVAB- On March 6th, 20 DVHS students in grades 10-12 were administered the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB). The ASVAB is the most widely used multiple-aptitude test battery in the world. It measures strengths, weaknesses, and potential for future success in four domains: verbal, math, science and technical, and spatial.



The ASVAB also helps determine which Military Occupational Specialties (MOS) the student qualifies for. DVHS offers the ASVAB once every year to all 10th, 11th, and 12th grade students. The ASVAB scores were received and interpreted for students by school counselor Mrs. Westgate-Keisling and representatives from each Military branch.



Weather Emergency Drill- The Delaware Valley conducted the state mandated weather emergency drill on March 7th. This drill takes place to have students and staff prepared in the event there is a storm, and students and staff need to be moved away from the windows. During this time all students and staff move to the hallways away from any windows or entrances and face directed towards walls and or lockers for safety.



Mind of an Athlete - On March 7th, Dr. Jarrod Spencer, Sports Psychologist, speaker, and author presented to Delaware Valley High School athletes. He shared tips on how a clear mind leads to better performance-beginning with getting enough sleep. He shared some great tips for taking care of our mental health through his "Mind of the Athlete" presentation.







SAT- On March 9th, 93 students were administered the SAT @ DVHS. The SAT is an exam that universities use to assess a student's college readiness. Originally called the "Scholastic Aptitude Test," the SAT is made by a company called The College Board. The SAT is scored on a scale of 400-1600. You'll have one score for Math, on a 200-800 scale, and one score for Verbal, which includes both Reading and the Writing and Language sections, also on a 200-800 scale.



Benefit Concert- On March 12th, the band, chorus and orchestra faculty and students hosted their benefit concert to raise money for the music department. This was a well-attended event that will contribute to future opportunities for students in the music department.

Women's Empowerment Round Table- Once again, Peace Studies had a successful Women's Empowerment RoundTable event. On March 14th, this performance was able to include classes from other disciplines and was reported on by *Del.Aware*. The panel of guests were Dr. Nicole Cosentino, Miss Jess Hubal, Ms. Marielle Cohen, Officer Amanda Boyd, the Honorable Cristin Cavallaro, and three current students Hallie Balogh, Auttie Grace, and Elizabeth Gruodis (Note: Hallie and Auttie are award winning authors (Empire). 


their AP Research project findings with a larger community, including four other AP Research students from surrounding area high schools.





Delaware Valley Elementary School Mary Ann Olsommer, Principal

- In mid-August, Mrs. Olsommer invited the incoming Kindergarten students and their families for a tour of DVES. It was a great opportunity for the Kindergarten students to take a step closer to becoming more comfortable and familiarize themselves with the school.
- The week before school began, Mrs. Olsommer and the kindergarten teachers
 welcomed new students for a new student orientation. Students and their families
 were able to tour the building and see their new classrooms where they would be
 spending the year.







Mrs. Olsommer held "Principal Chats" in every classroom during the first five days
of school. During the meetings, expectations for the school year were reviewed,
students engaged with Mrs. Olsommer, asking questions, some grade levels read a
story, and Mrs. Olsommer was able to relay the role of the principal in a school.



- The Warrior, a group of high school students, Dr. Cosentino, and Dr. Blaum visited each DVES classroom to create school spirit and encourage the students to attend the home opener football game on Friday night.
- Open House was held on September 6th. Parents and guardians had the opportunity to attend a meeting with their students' teachers to learn more about the classroom and the curriculum.

- Students in Kindergarten through third grade received their hearing screenings.
 District speech therapists along with school nurse Heidi Benedict-Lewis, conducted the state mandated hearing assessments provided annually.
- DVES participated in the district wide Spirit Week. Each day was celebrated with a theme and throughout the week, students donated their change by selecting a staff member to be "pied". At the end of the week, a pep rally was held where students cheered for classmates chosen to participate in a relay race. The rally ended with second grade teacher, Mr. Zielinski, being "pied" by his team member, Miss Casey. The students donated \$615.00 to the American Cancer Society.
- Students in first grade studied the life cycle of the butterfly. Mrs. Fountain's class named their butterfly, Bob the butterfly, and were excited to see him fly off when released on a beautiful September afternoon.



 Second Graders worked on the Living Things Unit. Students investigated how water travels through the stem to the leaves of plants by completing an experiment and recording the results.





Students in Mrs. Krisanda's third grade class learned about the life cycle of a plant.
Students made observations of their northern bean seeds before placing them in
plastic bags with wet paper towels and watched them begin to sprout as they hung
on the classroom windows, basking in the sunlight. Students continued to make
observations and record their findings in their science notebooks. They were

- excited to finally plant their seedlings in cups and take them home to continue nurturing them.
- Fourth graders in Mrs. Navitsky's class conducted an investigation on gummy
 worms as they learned about the scientific process. The class designed the
 experiment by asking the question, predicting what will happen to a gummy worm if
 put into water for 24 hours, came up with a hypothesis, listed supplies, and formed
 a conclusion after looking at their results





- To celebrate Constitution Day, Mrs. Kudrich's fifth grade classes learned about the U. S. Constitution and its Amendments. The fifth graders wrote their own personal Constitution.
- Students in Mrs. Moglia's fifth grade class learned about the scientific method in Science class. After studying and researching the steps, they were able to perform their own hands-on experiment using M&Ms and/or Skittles, following the scientific method. They had to draw their own conclusions about what they saw and experienced with the candy.
- For National School Bus Safety Week, Mrs. Olsommer reviewed bus safety rules with the students on each bus as they arrived.
- The Matamoras Fire Department visited in October. Kindergarten, first, and second grade students spent time with the firefighters learning about their job, seeing the fire trucks, and getting reminders on fire safety.
- Fourth grade students studied Native Americans. They learned about the different types of Native American tribes. They learned how the Native Americans used the entire buffalo for many reasons. Students then built dioramas of the different types of homes, as well as wrote summaries describing the tribes that used these homes, locations, and reasoning as to why these homes can be found in different places.
- Students in 5th grade watched a lesson from Discovery Education on why leaves change color. The students were able to make leaf rubbings on their own. They learned about the veins in the leaves and why they change color. The students were then able to create their own classroom tree and add their leaves to it.
- Students and their families attended the third annual Trunk or Treat in October.
 Faculty and staff, along with parent volunteers, decorated their trunks and dressed

- up in costume to pass out trinkets, goodies, and candy to costume-wearing attendees who paraded around the school. Fun was had by both the attendees as well as the volunteers!
- Students, faculty, and staff celebrated Halloween in costume! During the morning, kindergarten, first, and second graders paraded for the older grades. During the afternoon, the primary students viewed the third, fourth, and fifth graders as they paraded through the school.





 DVES celebrated Veterans on November 10th. Family and friend Veterans were invited to the school for a parade and assembly. Sergeant Gary Williams spoke to the school about his experience in Vietnam. In the assembly, he spoke about the equipment used and showed parts of his uniform. After the assembly, the Veterans were welcomed into the classrooms to answer questions and enjoy light refreshments.



- In November, the first Staff vs Student Basketball Game of the year was held for third, fourth, and fifth grade students. Students used their DV Dollars to purchase participation in the game. DV Dollars is an incentive for students to encourage independent reading. Each month students shop in a store, funded by the PTA.
- In a Ned Show assembly, Shanika Robertson told a story about Ned. To deliver Ned's message, Shanika conducted tricks with a yo-yo. Ned explained that many

things may not be possible yet, but with trying, over and over again sometimes, and not giving up, you can find your mindset and reach your goal.



The fifth grade embraced Thanksgiving by writing essays on what and why they
are thankful. Each student also personified a turkey's thoughts and on the last
day before the fall break visited classrooms in small groups to present the play,
The History of Thanksgiving, to the younger students.



• Mr. and Mrs. Claus (AKA Mr. Zielinski and Ms. Sudano) read 'Twas the Night Before Christmas to kindergarten and first grade students.





- The staff and students gathered for a pre-winter-break assembly. The assembly
 included traditions of teachers participating in a rendition of *The Twelve Days of Christmas*, a sing along, and a holiday themed relay race.
- Fourth grade students learned about electricity and magnetism by building circuits using cells, wires, light bulbs, and switches. Students tested the magnetism and strength of different materials.







- Third grade students in Mrs. Magee's class completed a project before winter break which entailed creating a Christmas tree that displayed some of their family traditions. Students did a fantastic job putting their projects together and presenting their work.
- Fifth graders in Mrs. Kudrich's class completed a "Three Gifts" essay. This was a
 creative writing assignment about how students felt about giving and receiving
 gifts. To go along with the creative writing, students also made a poster on "All I
 Want for Christmas", which were displayed outside of the classroom for other
 students and staff members to see.
- Thirty-two first through fifth grade students participated in the Spelling Bee held in January. Dr. Blaum was the announcer/pronouncer and Dr. Pope and Mrs. McNeely facilitated as judges. Fifth grader, Eddie Arias, won, spelling "knowingly" correctly, and represented DVES in the Regional online Bee in February.





 David Gonzales from Kindred Spirits Arts Program performed a wonderful storytelling act with piano accompaniment in an assembly. The students were all

- entertained and engaged! His stories taught meaningful lessons in an age appropriate and engaging way.
- At the end of January, students in band, orchestra, and chorus treated their family and friends to the first ever combined ensembles concert. It included all band, chorus, and advanced orchestra students in fourth and fifth grade. A total of eighty students participated! Students performed Disney hits including Mickey Mouse March, Let It Go, and a Disney hits medley. Students and music teachers dressed in their best "Disney wear" consisting of full costumes and Disney themed clothing.
- Students and faculty participated in the animal drive kindness challenge to help Pike County Humane Society raise money for animals in need. Students and faculty members who participated in the cause were asked to bring in pictures of their pets to hang on the "Animal Wall of Fame", which was put on display. Student Council members encouraged their peers each week, reminding them to participate in the challenge. A total of \$200 and four boxes of items were given to the Pike County Humane Society at the conclusion of the event.
- First grade students in Mrs. Curtis class learned about heating, cooling, melting, and freezing. They explored the different states of matter of water and experimented with wax paper to discover why snow looks white.
- January was 'National Hobby' month. Students in third grade picked their favorite hobby and presented this to their classmates. Students were encouraged to wear something pertaining to their favorite hobby, bring props to show classmates, and write about their interests.
- Fifth grade students in Mrs. Kudrich's class wrote an essay on their highlights from 2023 and what they are looking forward to in 2024. The students set academic goals, personal goals, and created a plan for attaining their goals in the essay.
- To conclude the learning of the letters of the alphabet and their sounds, Kindergarteners held a fashion show for their families! Students chose their letter and were given a plain brown bag to take home to create a vest and decorate with pictures of things that started with their letter. Some added to their vest by fully dressing like icebergs, princesses, tigers, and more! After proudly parading around the school for all grade levels to see, they walked the red carpet in a special show for their families and friends. The event ended with a song the kids had learned. It was a fun time for all!



- PreK learned the letter Q. They learned that Q does not like to be alone. Q always needs his best friend U with him and so, they got married! PreK had a Q-U wedding which included getting dressed up, walking to the altar, having a ceremony, a dance party, and a wedding cake!
- Many classes celebrated 100 days of school on February 6th. Some created pictures of themselves and wrote what they will be like when they are 100.
 Others shared 100 items that they found at home and counted for math class.
 Many students and staff dressed as if they were 100 years old or wore party hats that they made to commemorate the day.
- At the Sweetheart Dance, sponsored by the PTA, students and their guests danced the night away dressed in their best! A photographer was available to grab a portrait to remember the night, a raffle was held, and guests enjoyed cupcakes.







- During the Lip Sync Assembly in February, acts from all grades danced and lip synced to their favorite song as their audience sang and clapped along.
- The Drama Club made its debut with the production of "The Thirty-Three Little Pigs." Jessica Sudano and Kiley Sloan directed twenty – two fourth and fifth grade students for two months after school to be able to put the production together.



- Students in first grade learned about Martin Luther King, Jr. and how influential Dr. King was during the Civil Rights Movement. The students listened to stories, discussed the topic, and completed activities in Scholastic Magazine.
- Three OM teams competed in the Odyssey of the Minds Regional Competition at Pocono Mountain West High School on February 24th. Karen Orgitano's primary team competed in the Night Life Problem. Sarah Casey and Chuck Pikes Structural Team took first place in Deep Space Structure and Tammy Curtis' Technical Team placed first in Tech-No-Art where they were required to build a robot art critic to rate several works of art, dismantle one, and put it back together without using direct or indirect power. Two of the teams advanced to the State Competition in April.







• All of DVES celebrated the 2024 Leap Year! Mr. Zielinski dressed in a Hoppy Leap Frog costume to greet the students as they arrived for the day and everyone was encouraged to dress in green. The hallways had hopscotch and crazy lines to jump on while traveling. Hidden around the school were 26 pairs of lettered frogs. Each class was assigned a letter hidden on a frog, searched for it, and when found placed their frog on a lily pad bulletin board. The students learned frog facts throughout the day and lessons were taught on the life cycle of frogs, the 365 day calendar, and measuring how far leaping frogs can jump.



- Mrs. Padgett created a leprechaun hunt for students to celebrate St. Patrick's Day. Classes were provided with clues that included rhymes to use around the school.
- In a collaborative effort with The Pike County Courier, students in fourth and fifth grades learned about creating business advertisements and art careers.
 Afterwards, they rendered illustrations for a selection of local businesses. From these projects, a few were designated to become part of the upcoming Children's Edition Newspaper. Last year, Straus news mailed 85,000 copies of these wonderful sections to readers for free.
- Working with the Dickson House Children's Advocacy Center, students created pinwheels to bring awareness to Child Abuse Prevention Month after developmentally appropriate discussions. These pinwheels were displayed around the county in local businesses. Pinwheels were the selected theme this year because they represent playfulness, joy, and childhood.
- Emily Mansfield, from the Pike County Conservation Office, visited each of the three fourth grade classrooms to talk about watersheds. She shared with the students the different ways in which our lakes and streams are contaminated, and she talked about the ways that students can help to protect our environment and our local watershed.
- Fourth grade students had the opportunity for the local National Park Service and Ranger Anna to come and give each class a one-hour presentation on the Solar Eclipse. The students were taught about how eclipses occur and made special glasses to wear while viewing an eclipse. They had an opportunity to make eclipse bookmarks with UV activated beads, solar viewers, and complete a writing prompt about where they will be for the next solar eclipse in 2042.
- Students in fifth grade created and presented five different landforms. Each
 project was individually invented by our own amazing, artistic students. They
 planned with a blueprint and then put their final products on display for all to see.





• Read Across America week occurred March 4th-8th. Students enjoyed Dr. Seuss inspired fun throughout the week. The themes included Fox in Socks day, One Fish Two Fish Red Fish Blue Fish day, Wacky Wednesday, Green Eggs and Ham day, and Cat in the Hat day. Each theme included numerous fun activities for students to participate in. Some of which included wearing mismatched socks, a sock design contest, dressing in red, blue, or head to toe in their favorite color, trying some green eggs and ham, and dressing as their favorite Dr. Seuss character. Teachers and staff members volunteered to dress up in disguise and read aloud books. Students participated in guessing who each staff member was in the video.



- Third grade teachers conducted a reading incentive during March and April.
 Rather than Bingo, students completed a READ-O row on their bingo board to
 earn extra recess. Twenty-six students completed a row on the board. It was a
 motivating incentive to encourage students to read.
- Students at DVES crushed their reading goals all school year! In the beginning of
 the year, the Title I students conferenced with their reading teacher to discuss
 their various scores on their DIBELS assessments. They then identified areas
 they could work to improve on. With this information the students set a reading
 goal and created a tracking sheet to ensure they were accountable for their
 progress. Each week after they were progress monitored, they would mark their
 score on their tracking sheets. Once the student hit their individualized goal they

would be presented with a certificate, their picture would then be taken and placed on the GOAL CRUSHERS bulletin board. Their achievement picture was also sent home to their family members, so they could share and celebrate their accomplishment. The students would then reevaluate their progress and set another reading goal. Having the students set their own goals and track their progress really held each child accountable for their own reading success. The GOAL CRUSHERS bulletin board was filled with huge smiles of very proud and successful students!

On April 6th, two teams from DVES competed in the Odyssey of the Mind State competition at the Pocono Mountain East Campus. The technical team competed in the Al Tech-No-Art problem. They created a humorous skit about an unusual art contest. They were challenged to create a device that could determine if a work of art is beautiful or not, dismantle the work of art, and create a new work of art. The team took 2nd place out of 8 teams and moved on to compete at the World Finals in Iowa. The structure team competed in the Deep Space Structure problem. They had to present a creative performance about making a discovery in Deep Space. The team also needed to create a balsa wood structure that is no more than 18 grams to test for weight. The structure held 805 pounds during the allotted time. The structure held 1,015 lbs after time was called. The team placed 1st and advanced to the World Finals in Iowa.



- Mrs. Magee's third grade class learned about rocks and minerals in Science during April. With teamwork, collaboration, and patience, the students were able to dig to find gemstones. After they dug for their gemstones, they identified their gemstones with each other.
- Earth Day was celebrated during the week of April 22nd. Every class participated
 in four outdoor educational activities such as footprint identification, acting out the
 web of life, and a recycling relay race. Classes took a nature walk around the
 school property where signs were posted to help identify trees and plants. The
 DVES Kindness Club hosted a special Earth Day pep rally. During the pep rally,

- students played ecology games, presented fun facts about conservation, and gave each classroom their own seedling to take care of for the remainder of the school year.
- April 18th was the annual art show. The 2024 theme was Woodland Forest. Over 500 images were hung with at least one artwork being displayed for every student in grades K - 5. Additional activities included an art scavenger hunt with prize basket, scratch art, clay decorating, and picture frame decorating were available.
- During the month of April, the first 5-week session of Grades 3 5 Art Club was hosted. In a unique approach, this year's Art Club format has been composed of student leaders collaborating with Mrs. Zito in order to create various centerbased stations during each session.
- Candy bar bingo was hosted by the PTA. The popular Family Fun Night was well attended with almost all seats taken. Fun was had by all!
- Kindergarten registration was held on May 8th. Thirty three incoming kindergarten students met some of the faculty and staff and learned about DVES.
- The Kindergarten teachers held their annual Mother's Day tea for their students and their parents or guardians. Cookies with tea or coffee were prepared and served and the students performed a song for the guests. The tables were decorated with placemats made by the students.
- During a 4H visit, second grade students learned about soybean farming. Ms.
 Smith from the Pike County Penn State extension read a story with the classes followed by different agriculture activities. The second graders made a small greenhouse with a bean seed inside. Students worked on matching different types of bugs, sorting beans, and using a remote-controlled truck to show how the seeds are transported. The final activity was an investigation and sorting of items that contained soybeans.



• The fourth grade learned about food chains and food webs. Students worked in pairs to dissect owl pellets to see what types of animals were a part of an owl

- food chain. They sorted and identified the various types of bones found in the pellets.
- Two teams from Delaware Valley Elementary School competed at the Odyssey
 of the Mind World Finals from May 20th May 23rd. They competed against
 teams from across the United States and other countries. The structure team
 placed 6th and the technical team placed 4th in the World!





- Each grade level attended a field trip. Kindergarten spent the day at Milford Beach, 1st grade visited the Pike County Library, the Matamoras Fire Department, and Firefly Park, 2nd grade went to PEEC, 3rd grade visited Kettle Creek, 4th grade traveled to the Lackawanna Coal Mine, and 5th Grade learned at Fort Delaware and Minisink Battlefield.
- Students counted down the days until the end of the year using the alphabet.
 Students throughout the different grade levels completed different activities daily, which related to the letter of the day.



• The students at DVES had the pleasure of watching an end of year Magic show from The Extreme Magic of Eric. Eric was on America's Got Talent, several latenight talk shows, and has been in many schools across the country. Eric and his assistant had a fabulous performance that the children enjoyed, laughed at, and engaged with. The magic show captured their attention from levitating students, to escaping boxes, to outfit changes in a blink of the eye.

- The students enjoyed outdoor activities and games including parachute fun, kickball, 40-yard dash races, and sponge relays on Field Day. In addition, there were snow cones, sponsored by the PTA.
- The fifth-grade class was honored in a Moving Up Ceremony to commemorate the end of the year. Students, along with their family and friends, celebrated successes from the school year, remembered their days at DVES, and acknowledged their graduation to the middle school.


Pinwheels

Business Michael Murray, Department Chair

The 2023-24 school year had continued growth in the Business Department stemming from prior commitments to recruit more students to these courses. In addition to staff recruitment, many students saw the benefit of taking business courses as a path to gain college credit.

The Business Department saw its greatest number of students for the third year in a row. Numbers were up in almost every class. This trend will most likely continue as the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania will now require a ½ Semester course in Personal Budgeting for all incoming freshmen in the '24-25 school year before graduation. Exposure to this content, of which Delaware Valley already has a comprehensive course, should bring additional students to future business classes.

Highlights:

Speakers/Career Day:

The Guidance Department did a great job in May hosting its annual Career Day. The speaker, from varied careers including many in the business realm, spoke to sophomores about the training, education, and day to day activities in their fields. These local professionals introduced many career opportunities that students may not have known to exist.

Accounting 1: College credit can be earned

In this course students learn how businesses plan for and evaluate the operating, financing and investing decisions and then how accounting systems gather and provide data to internal and external decisions makers. Students are exposed to careers in the actuarial sciences and financial industries. Students did engage in the PICPA Accounting Career Field Trip and had two State Qualifiers in FBLA Accounting 1.



Business Communications:

Business Communication offered students a broad learning experience that encouraged creativity and allowed them to enhance their public speaking skills. This class gave students the opportunity to step outside of their comfort zones. Students were assigned 5 speeches throughout the semester; each speech was longer than the last. Highlights of the course throughout the year included guest speakers, such as the CFO of a brewery and the owner of an excavation company.

Students also learned how to appropriately communicate in the business setting using the Textbook *Essentials of Business Communication*. Topics were presented via

PowerPoint in a lecture-based format where students took notes. Criteria covered included but was not limited to: Sending and Receiving Positive, Neutral, and Negative Messages, Direct Claim Resolution, Revising Business Messages, and Professionalism in the Workplace (Business Ethics, Proper Etiquette, Teamwork, and Conducting Meetings.



Personal Budgeting & Finance:

In Personal Budget and Finance students were offered a variety of different learning methods. In addition to learning the skills to make informed decisions about real world financial issues, they participated in the following activities:

The Morning Brew: (www.morningbrew.com)

For a warm-up, each day students would read through current event articles related to business (in the Morning Brew). This was a great way to keep track of what was happening in the business world and to keep tabs on stock market trends.



Virtual Business: (www.knowledgematters.com)

Virtual Business is an online learning curriculum with 18 different modules that were each broken down into 3 sections (reading, math, and a simulation) on each topic. The topics covered include but are not limited to: "Finding a Job", "Finding an Apartment", "Choosing and Balancing a Checking Account". Getting a Credit Card", "Fixing Your Credit", and ending with "Buying a Home" and "How to Purchase Insurance".



The students also participated in the *How the Market Works:* (www.howthemarketworks.com)

Students were given \$100,000 of play money to research, track, and invest in stocks all while competing against schools across the State of Pennsylvania. We also created friendly competition within our classroom and the students were up for the challenge. The website is very intuitive and allows students to do in-depth research about how/what drives the stock of major companies and what potential pitfalls to avoid while investing.

Two students won cash prizes from the Dime Bank, one for 1st Place in the Student Stock Market Game and the other for 3rd Place in the Budget Challenge.

In addition, Delaware Valley also had two State Qualifiers in the FBLA Personal Finance competition.



Introduction to Business - College Credit can be earned.

Intro to Business students continue to research Fortune 500 and local companies throughout the course. This project is meant to create awareness of the businesses that they patronize and that operate around them on a regular basis. Integrating it with a basic understanding of how the economy works allows students to approach the business world with a more educated perspective. The class looks at how businesses are formed from their nascent origins and grow into larger business structures. Students also research the sustainability efforts of those companies. The students researched all careers that involved working in the business industry from management, entrepreneurship, real estate, finance, and economics.



Web Development:

Students created websites using the Adobe complete program. Students also learned the principles of design to enhance their projects. They used the internet to research a wide range of technology-related careers, especially those pertaining to Web development.

Computer Applications:

Students created spreadsheets, databases, mail merge letters, and WORD documents, visual presentations and integrated projects. They also researched technology-related careers.

Video Game Design

In Video Game Design, students were introduced to the history of gaming as well as the numerous components and labor hours that go into designing a video game from its origins.

FBLA witnessed one State Qualifier in the area of Video Game Design.

Topics included but are not limited to: Introduction to Basic Functions, Hardware Technology, Collision Theory and Game Logic, Pixel Mapping, and Landscaping Design.

Microsoft Office Suite pairs well with some of the assignments from the textbook "Video Game Design Foundations". Students used animation functions in Microsoft PowerPoint to learn key foundations of designing a video game. Microsoft Excel was used in lessons involving Pixelating images and Pixel mapping.

This class culminated with students applying what they have learned to develop their own video game from original thought to implementation.

They first had to storyboard "plan" their game on paper. This was followed by creation of character development (names, appearance, etc.), overall mission of the game, achievements, point-based system, how to win or complete the game, etc. Their games were shared using the software developed by *Game Factory 2*.

Business Law:

The students participated in activities relating to personal law. Business Law students researched careers in the Legal profession such as attorneys, law enforcement personnel, and government agencies involved in the judicial system. Guest speakers this year included an attorney who specializes in civil matters and the District Attorney of Elk County.



Career Exploration:

Career Exploration is a project-driven course. The students started by creating a High School Timeline of achievements they want to conquer and/or had conquered throughout their career at Delaware Valley High School. The class transitioned into a more "Career-Readiness" focus, Comparing Colleges, Conducting Career Research at www.bls.gov (Bureau of Labor Statistics) and www.pacareerzone.org (Pennsylvania Career Zone), as well as engaging in proper interview techniques and what to expect during an interview (Top 100 asked Interview Questions, Types of Interviews, Takingnotes during an interview, and asking questions at the end of an interview).

Students completed a variety of self-evaluation tools throughout this course. Each student conducted a Strengths, Weaknesses, Areas of Opportunities, and potential Threats (S.W.O.T Analysis) in starting a new career that they researched, narrowed down, and are focusing on. Students were also introduced to S.M.A.R.T Goals (Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Relevant, Timely) to make their existing goals more achievable.

Lastly, this class focused on the importance of having a well thought out Cover Letter and Resume when applying for positions.



Introduction to Hospitality – College credit can be earned:

Hospitality students used the Pocono Mountain Visitors Bureau website to learn more about the recreational environment that exists around them. The students learned about working in the travel and tourism industries such as hotels and resorts, cruise ships, culinary careers, recreational leaders, and national parks. Students researched and compared local dining establishments with nationally recognized food chains.

7th grade Career Leadership classes at DVMS and DDMS:

Career Leadership:

The students participated in class discussions as well as numerous projects to enhance understanding of the topics covered in the class. Students reflected on how the different topics relate to their lives, and how they can work to develop positive characteristics and habits.

Students began to explore college and career options, completed career readiness surveys, developed resumes, and began to put together a plan starting in 7th grade and finishing with the career they hope to pursue. The students also created a slideshow and presentation on a career of their choice, with ten slides covering all different aspects, conducted interviews of adults for the how-why-etc. of their career choice, completed a budget activity to determine how much students would have to earn to support their lifestyle, created career posters depicting related tasks, and describing elements of that workforce, created a career family tree showing what different generations did for work, showing how careers change over time and collected career artifacts for their electronic career portfolios for the guidance office.



Computer Literacy:

The students explored numerous 21st century skills in this portion of the class. They all began the year learning keyboarding skills, which they continued practicing throughout the school year. The students took some time exploring internet safety and how to use the internet as an effective research tool. The students built numerous Power Point projects and learned advanced skills within Power Point. We also spent time going over the 21st century skill of how to give an effective presentation using those Power Points. The students familiarized themselves with Microsoft Office. The class also compared the difference between Google Applications and Microsoft Office and how students can use the two programs together

Student Organizations/Competitions – FBLA at the High School and Middle School



FBLA at Delaware Valley High School:

The Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA) chapter at DVHS is the largest clubs at DVHS. This year the club was comprised of over 80 members. The students are highly active in community service which enabled the chapter to receive awards at the local and state levels. Students assist in the Pike County Day of Caring, serve as guides for Parent/Teacher conferences and Back to School Night., Humane Society, Safe Haven and peer tutoring. The students also fundraise and contribute a portion of their proceeds to the PA FBLA State Project each year.

The students participate in three competitions yearly. Students need to qualify at the local level to proceed to the state event in Hershey and national competitions. Events consist of individual, group, performance and state-only events relating to business and technology.



The team had over 60 State Qualifiers (a DV record) including 17 who will go on to compete in the National Leadership Conference held in Orlando, Florida at the end of June.

FBLA at Dingman- Delaware & Delaware Valley Middle Schools:

CAREER AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION Barbara Coyle, Dept Chair



OVERVIEW:

The 2023-2024 school year has been one of great activity for our department. We are grateful to the DVHS Administration, Dr. Blaum, Dr. Cosentino, Mr. DeLauro, the School Board, and especially our students and parents for their support. Each program's Occupational Advisory Committee continuously provides us with real-world feedback to implement in our programs- their dedication and guidance are beyond valuable. We continue to expand our dual enrollment and articulation agreements with our postsecondary partners (Luzerne County Community College, Lackawanna College, Keystone College, Johnson College and Sussex County Community College) through our SOAR- Students Occupationally and Academically Ready program. This year we were excited to begin a partnership with Sussex County Community College. During the year all Programs invite representatives from our post-secondary partners to guestspeak or conduct field trips to campuses. Our team of Instructors, Administration and our Guidance Counselor, Jennifer Cosentino represent and advocate for our department as we continue to "spread the word" about the value of CTE and attract and enroll an ever-growing number of students to prepare them for careers of the future. We are grateful to our consultants Dr. Robert Mauro and Dr. Dan Perna for their guidance and expertise.

We are grateful to our academic partners: Ms. Alison Newman works with each program weekly to explore current events and career preparedness to enhance literacy. Each year, Mrs. Newman works with the CTE students to create trade-focused lessons highlighting their fields of study. As a final project, Mrs. Newman works with the CTE students to create resumes related to their courses and certifications. Students also learn how to write cover letters when applying for jobs. Many CTE students utilize the resumes to apply for summer jobs, compete in CTE competitions, and to apply for college and trade schools. Since they remain in their CTE programs for three years, the students add to their resumes as they acquire new skills. Mr. Tom Smith works with all instructors regarding the mathematical tasks required by our programs, and Ms. Denise Nickles works with all students to ensure core subject and program work is completed so our students may continue and thrive in our programs.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS:

Automotive Technology:



The Automotive Technology Program continues to provide services to district and community drivers while providing state-of-the-art education to our students. Automotive Technology is at maximum enrollment. As with all our programs, it required an enormous amount of preparation and creativity to balance classroom material and hands-on work. Enrollment for the 2023-2024 year was Level 1- 17 students, Level 2-16 students, Level 3 with 4 students. There are 19 new students enrolled for the 2024-2025 school year.

Building Trades:



The Building Trades program had 11 Level 1, 6 Level 2 and 9 Level 3 Students for the school year. This year level 1 and level 2 students framed a demonstration house in the Electrical shop. Level 2 laid up a block crawl space foundation and level one framed it. BC 2 and 3 also installed a new roof, soffits and fascia on the tennis shed, Big Fish play sets, and new platforms for the graduation stage. We also performed many other small projects around campus. Our classroom were the runaway winners of the Christmas door decorating contest. Many students contributed to a creative display depicting Clark Griswald hanging on to the gutter.

5 of our 9 seniors participated in CO OP this year. Huge thanks goes out to Mrs. Morelli. All six of my rising seniors are hoping to enroll in CO OP next year based on the feedback of the current seniors.

Business and Marketing:

This is a three-year instructional marketing career technical educational program. Students are prepared to enter careers in advertising, marketing, public relations, corporate, and sales (among many others). The business and marketing program allows students to develop strong leadership qualities, strengthen communication skills, and hone exceptional time-management skills. Some of the topics covered in this class include but are not limited to advertising, retail, merchandising, business operations, promotion, selling, economics, finance, distribution, inventory control, pricing, entrepreneurship, and professional development.

There is a total of 21 students enrolled in the program for the 2023/2024 school year.

Level 1 (Sophomores): 15 students

Level 2 (Juniors): 5 students Level 3 (Senior): 1 student

Our Occupational Advisory Committee prioritizes recruitment and bettering this program. Through the efforts of my students, we were successfully able to recruit 7 new students for the fall of 2024. The CTE students put together a presentation to recruit in

all freshman seminar classes as well as scheduling time in the learning commons to present to students who missed the recruitment day.

This group of students took a huge leap forward in creating content to help promote our school district to the community. We were tasked with creating digital marketing content for the new state of the art scoreboard in our stadium. This group took off and blew my expectations away. They were able to create professional content to promote our lacrosse teams (boys and girls), the PA Special Olympics, and even create marketing materials for our sponsors. They were asked to create content for a potential investor and helped in securing that investment. This is such a valuable real-life learning experience for these students.

Level 2 and 3 students in front of the scoreboard. Students working on digital content. In the fall, this group executed this program's first ever district-wide online sale. This was a collaboration with the 1DV initiative. Students obtained information from their target market, decided what items they wanted to sell, and contacted Promo Gear for a quote. Once the sale was launched on our website, they processed data and sales in real time, while fielding customer emails and inquiries. Once the merchandise was delivered, the items were sorted and packaged in unique styles and distributed to all the buildings in our district. This was a weeklong sale, but the students worked incredibly hard for around 5 weeks. This was such a great opportunity and really allowed the students to see every level of the business to consumer experience.

Another opportunity from this year was for the marketing team to design/create a new crest for the DVHS Girls Varsity Soccer team. The head coach, Kevin Quinn, came to us looking to take the program in a new direction with a re-brand. We held a competition to design a new logo that encompasses his coaching philosophy and the teams valued tradition. With those specifics given to the team, they started to create logos to have everyone in the program vote to get to the final 5. Once it was narrowed down, we had coach Quinn come in to choose a final logo. A student in our level 2 ultimately was the winner and now his work will be the face of a DV sports team for years to come.



Diversified Occupations and Capstone:





Our Diversified Occupations/Capstone program was very active during the school year and had a total of 12 students. Ms. Morelli worked tirelessly with program instructors, students and area employers to create real-world work experiences and increase the district's presence in the community.

All students receive OSHA-10-hour Workplace Safety certification through CareerSafe.

Culinary Arts:



Chef Niosi and Mrs. Luna arranged for fire safety personnel from Pike County Training Center to visit this fall to speak to all CTE students regarding fire safety and equipment use. Fire safety is covered and required in all programs and students had a great opportunity to learn about the use and types of fire extinguishers. Each student also had the opportunity to use a training extinguisher. A unique experience!

A variety of soups, salads, sandwiches, and baked goods were offered to staff via a "grab and go" system. This allowed our students to meet and fulfill last-minute orders.

Early Childhood Education:





The students in Early Childhood Education Program had a very busy year! We started the year working on the requirements to be able to volunteer at 4 local early learning centers. The students obtained clearances, were first aid and CPR certified, and completed the mandated reporter training. The students spent half of the week in class and the other half of the week rotating though clinical experiences at Mt. View, Green Trees, Sunshine Station, and CDD. During class time the students completed some fun and exciting activities. They wrote their own children's books, created lesson plans, and designed their own playgrounds just to name a few! Students also had the opportunity to visit East Stroudsburg University and take part in the AEPP Edu Future Fest. Enrollment for the year.

We also participated in ESU's Aspiring Educator Pathway Project in April. Keystone College dual enrollment was fully funded with grant money or a total of \$6,700.

Electrical Trades:



During the school year Mr. Watson and his students installed an EV (Electric Vehicle) charging station for the Automotive Shop and installed 2- 50amp circuits for the Warrior Café, reviewing and practicing shop safety throughout.

The Electrical Trades Program had a total of 10 Level 1, 8 Level 2 and 7 Level 3 students. This year students worked on tool identification, tool safety use and load calculation. Students also studied industry workplace safety, shop safety, professionalism, and post-secondary industry options. Electrical Trades students worked closely with the Automotive and Building Trades programs on their respective projects involving wiring. There are 18 new students enrolled for the 2024-20245 school year.

Healthcare Careers:

Our program finished the year with 17 Level 1, 12 Level 2 and 11 Level 3 students. All passed for the year. Of our graduating seniors, 8 have enrolled in 4-year post-secondary programs, 2 in 2-year post-secondary and 1 is entering the workforce. There are 12 new students enrolled for the 2023-2024 school year.

Our Level 2 and 3 students receive CPR/AED Certification, OSHA-10 Workplace Safety Certification (specific to Healthcare workers) This year we added a new requirement, Mandated Reporter Certification through the University of Pittsburgh.

This year we welcomed the American Red Cross for 3 blood drives (United Way Day of Caring and 2 Student drives). Our students, led by our student leadership team, worked with Ms. Kresse to recruit donors. On Drive Day we registered donors, escorted donors

post-donation and managed the canteen table, mindful of any donors who were not feeling well and reporting to staff.

Our students also worked with district nursing staff to facilitate hearing screenings at all schools. They worked with the Audiologists to prepare and instruct students for the screening.

This year we continued our partnership with our school's Transition Program. With Ms. Adames we met weekly with students to instruct and discuss topics such as nutrition, hygiene, first aid and fitness.

The Healthcare Careers Program and the Early Childhood Education Program partnered this year for our 2nd annual" Teddy Bear Clinic". Each preschooler was invited to bring a stuffed animal from home. Accompanied by ECE Program students, they came to the Healthcare Lab and moved through stations set up to simulate a trip to doctor's office or emergency department. It was a Win-Win-Win Day: Pre-Schoolers received a chance to see how medical visits weren't always scary, the ECE students were able to work with preschoolers to explain and guide them through the process and the Healthcare students gained valuable experience interacting with pediatric populations.

FBLA (Future Business Leaders of America)

FBLA-PBL (Phi Beta Lambda) inspires and prepares students to become communityminded business leaders in a global society through relevant career preparation and leadership experiences.

This year we had 101 students join Future Business Leaders of America. Of that 101, 66 members qualified to compete at the State Leadership Conference in Hershey, PA. This conference ran from April 8 – 11. From the state competition, we had 26 members qualify for the National Leadership Conference that will take place in Orlando, FL. The dates of the conference will be June 28 – July 3. Senior Mackenzie Donald will step down as her role of Pennsylvania State President, Sophomore Ava Troup has been elected as State Treasurer, and overall, our chapter was awarded the William H. Sheldon Outstanding Chapter award.







FCCLA (Future Career and Community Leaders of America)

FCCLA equips members with real world skills through Family and Consumer Sciences (FCS) education by preparing members for careers through its four Career Pathways: Human Services, Hospitality and Tourism, Education and Training, and Visual Arts and Design.

FCCLA members will strengthen skills, forge friendships, and make a positive difference in today's world through participation in Competitive Events, serving in leadership positions, attending conferences across the nation, networking with youth leaders, and attaining essential college- and career-ready skills.

During the year 20 students competed in FCCLA's State Competition at Seven Springs. 10 qualifiers will attend the National level competition in Seattle in July. We participated in FCCLA with 20 students competing at states, and 18 moving on to Nationals in July.



HOSA- Future Health Professionals



HOSA is a global student-led organization recognized by the U.S. Department of Education and the Department of Health and Human Services and several federal and state agencies. HOSA's mission is to empower HOSA-Future Health Professionals to become leaders in the global health community, through education, collaboration, and experience. HOSA actively promotes career opportunities in the health industry and to enhance the delivery of quality health care to all people.

Warrior HOSA had a total of 25 students enroll in the club for the school year. Club membership is open to both CTE and non-CTE students, grades 9-12. We were excited to attend PA HOSA's State Leadership Conference at the Wyndham Lancaster Resort in March. DV HOSA brought a delegation of 18 competitors in team and individual events such as Medical Terminology, Medical Assisting, Human Growth and Development, Pharmacology, Pathophysiology, Behavioral Health, Biotechnology and Dental Science. 3 of our competitors placed in the top 10.



SKILLS USA

We had a strong participation in SkillsUSA. Building construction students participated in Masonry, Carpentry, Building Construction, Plumbing, Cabinetmaking, Painting and Decorating and Chapter Display. The highlight of Skills USA this year was Lydia Navarro (Auto Student) winning the customer service competition at the state conference and qualifying for the national competition in Atlanta GA in June. She is our first national qualifier in recent memory (I think since the 90's).



English Language Development (ELD) Raycharlyn Krasulski, Chairperson

Highlights:

Our English Learners (ELs) continued to excel in our seven buildings. Our ELs shined in various co-curricular activities including various clubs and sports at the elementary and secondary levels. Our ELs earned various achievements in and outside the classroom. Our ELs did excELent things this school year!

Reading Olympics –

- The DVHS Reading Olympics team took first place at the Spring Challenge on April 19th at Easton High School. The students read 35 titles and rotated through rounds of questions about those books as they competed against their peers from other high schools. Our high school continues to be a force to be reckoned with at this competition, taking home second place (only one point away from first place and nine points higher than last year).
- DVMS and DDMS sent three teams to the regional Reading Olympic Easton Area High School in April. The middle school teams competed against other middle school teams by answering trivia questions on twenty-five books. The DVMS team brought home fifth place honors, and the DDMS teams came in second and fourth place. Great job by all of these voracious readers.

Debates –

- O Annual Combo Debates Debate season is one of the most highly anticipated times of the year for students in the Combined English/History program (grades 9-11). Never before has the need for civil discourse and the ability to disagree respectfully been more important. Learning to debate provides our students with the understanding that both sides of a disagreement should be heard and fleshed out as opinions are formed. The activity also gives students practice on speaking and listening skills as addressed by the Pennsylvania Core Standards.
- Exploring the Written and Spoken Word Throughout the year, students in grades 6-12 are given various opportunities to develop their writing and communication skills. DVSD offers writing-based electives (Journalism I, II, and III and Effective Writing), after school writing activities (a literary magazine club and a newspaper club at both middle schools, and a creative writing club and a podcast club at the high school), and in-class opportunities to strengthen students' written and spoken expression.
- **Literary Magazine** Students from both DDMS and DVMS produced original works, creating a literary magazine in both buildings this year.
- **Newspaper** Both middle schools produced high quality newspapers this year. These programs help to develop our future *Del.Aware* editorial staff.

• The Del.Aware

- The staff of the *Del.Aware* published seven regular editions and a 40-page senior edition this school year.
- Emma Ciancio, a student at Delaware Valley High School, was selected to represent Milford, PA as a National Youth Correspondent to the 2024 Washington Journalism and Media Conference at George Mason University. Ciancio joins a select group of students from all over the country for an intensive study of journalism and media. Ciancio was chosen based on academic accomplishments and a demonstrated interest and excellence in journalism and media studies. National Youth Correspondents participate in hands-on, experiential learning through decision-making simulations that challenge them to solve problems and explore the creative, practical, and ethical tensions inherent in journalism and media.
- On October 27, Delaware Valley High School's 9 junior journalism students and their advisor Mrs. Leslie Lordi visited the Karambelas Media and Communication Center at Wilkes University. Various professors and students took time out of their day to teach

- the students about their radio, newspaper, broadcast, speech/debate, and public relations programs. The students were able to ask questions in each session and gain insight into the college experience. They were also able to tour state-of-the-art communications facilities.
- Congratulations to the following *Del.Aware* staff members from Delaware Valley High School who won awards in the Pennsylvania Press Club, affiliate of the National Federation of Press Women, 2024 High School Journalism Contest: senior Michael Helt, honorable mention, news story writing; senior Roxy Cauchi, first place, news or feature photo; senior Francesca Antonecchia, first place, sports photo and third place, single page layout; senior Cassandra Joyce, honorable mention, sports photo; senior Kaylee Kurcon, honorable mention, single page layout; and senior Hazel Buro, second place, double truck layout. There were 169 total entries for this contest.
- The student journalists at Delaware Valley High School attended the 24th annual Tom Bigler Journalism Conference at Wilkes University on, April 26. Congratulations to the Del.Aware newspaper staff as they won various awards. Senior Michael Helt won second place for news writing, junior Emma Ciancio won first place for opinion writing, senior Kaylee Kurcon won first place for page layout/design, and senior Francesca Antonecchia won second place for sports photography.

Highlights:

Delaware Valley Highschool:

Friend of Family and Consumer Sciences:

On April 13th Dr. Brian Blaum, Dr. Nicole Cosentino, and Mrs. Beth Pavinich joined Mrs. Mercy Ross at the Pennsylvania Association of Family and Consumer Science state conference. The conference was held at Central Penn College in Summerdale Pa. Dr. Blaum and the Delaware Valley School District were presented with the Friends Of Family and Consumer Sciences award for the support of the Family and Consumer Sciences programs in our district.



Intermediate Foods A and B:

Bake for Good Project:

The Family & Consumer Sciences Department participated in the Bake for Good Program offered through King Arthur Bread Company this school year. Through this program, students learned about the bread making process, the roles each ingredient plays in the baking process, how the ingredients interact with one another, and key terminology related to baking. King Arthur generously donates all supplies and ingredients to teachers involved in the program. Students throughout our department worked in small groups to prepare loaves of bread that were then donated to the Ecumenical Food Pantry. In total, DVHS Family & Consumer Sciences students donated 75 loaves of bread to our wonderful community outreach program!





In the Intermediate Foods B course, Mrs. Peter's students experimented with creating their own Ramen Bowls. Students prepared their own broths and noodles, while creating their own individual bowls to enjoy.







Pies, Pie and more Pies! Students in Mrs. Peters Intermediate Foods courses created individual pies to take home for the holidays. Students in our Foods B course prepare homemade Apple and Pumpkin Pie that they decorated with a decorative design, while the Intermediate Foods A students prepare homemade Chicken Pot Pies. In both classes students learned to prepare homemade pie crusts and took part in preparing all parts of their homemade fillings.









Pizza! Students within Mrs. Peters Intermediate Foods B students had a unique opportunity to tour and work alongside Colin Smith from John's of Arthur Ave. in Milford. Mr. Smith invited our students to his restaurant where they had the opportunity to see the behind-the-scenes workings of a restaurant, explore the various kitchen roles and responsibilities, and had the opportunity to prepare homemade pizza dough alongside Mr. Smith & his dough maker- Mr. Jim. Mr. Smith then returned to DVHS once the dough had aged to work with the students to assemble their own homemade pizzas in class.









I scream, you scream, we all scream for Ice Cream!!! As part of our dairy unit, students within in Mrs. Peters Intermediate Foods B classes prepared homemade ice cream within an Ice Cream Challenge. Each kitchen competed against one another to prepare their homemade creations. The winning dish was a Coffee Ice Cream served in a homemade Waffle Cone!







The Intermediate Foods B students have learned different preparation and cooking methods for dairy products. They made Macaroni and Cheese with a roux and learned the science behind rock salt helping to lower the freezing point to make ice cream. During the milk tasting, students learned how fat affects the flavor and texture of milk, and that water is not added, but fat is removed.









During the Meat unit students in Mrs. Ross's Intermediate Foods B classes learned the primal cuts of beef and then compared beef to deer by butchering venison. Students applied safe handling and storing techniques for processing and preparing meats. Students enjoyed the hands-on experience of processing the meat and then making tacos and roasts from venison. Beef burgers were also a hit while learning the correct way to check the internal temperatures to prevent food borne illnesses.







The Foods A and B classes made Ratatouille and Fondue to share with Mrs. Maino's French classes, while the French students shared details about French cuisine.





During Intermediate Foods A, Ms. Propst's students enjoyed getting in the kitchen and learning all about the fundamentals of safety, sanitation, and cooking! Some of Ms. Propst's students' favorite labs were making baked goods while learning how to measure properly and breakfast sandwiches to close out the egg unit.







During Intermediate Foods B, Ms. Propst's students were able to utilize the skills that they learned in Foods A to touch on other food subjects like Yeast Breads, Dairy, and Pies and Pastries. During the quick bread vs. yeast bread unit, besides making NY style bagels, students completed their "Bake for Good" project. During the pies and pastries unit, students learned how to make their own homemade pie crusts. They used those pie crusts to make fruit pies of their choice.









Gourmet Foods:

Students gained an understanding of global cuisines which helped them to appreciate different cultures. They were encouraged to try different foods while enhancing their cooking skills. Within their kitchen groups, students learned the value of teamwork and

sharing. Sometimes the students would debate who had the better cooking skills and finished product.









Ms. Propst's Gourmet Foods made a variety of meals and treats from different areas of the world! Students learned about South American cuisine and made homemade empanadas which are a fan favorite! They also learned the basic cooking skills as this may have been their first cooking class. Students created dishes like homemade pierogies, stir fried rice, Belgian waffles, and Israeli donuts. Ms. Propst's Gourmet class and Mr. Cotroneo's AP Spanish class had a cross-curricular culture day pertaining to Day of the Dead, which is known in many countries and cultures as All Souls Day. Mr. Cotroneo's class presented the cultural comparisons and contrasts of the day, complete with an altar, while Ms. Propst's class prepared the cookies. Karter and Luke Peerboom made their famous "Taco on the table" for everyone to enjoy!



Housing and Design:

Students in Housing and Design learned about the importance of special organization and functional design while making floor plans of their future home. Students drew their floor plans to scale to ensure that the dimensions of the plan accurately represented the space that they were designing.





While learning about the elements of design, students agreed that color was the most important element and that it makes a lasting impression. Students learned about the primary, secondary, and tertiary colors as well as the different color schemes. Students participated in hands on projects to ensure they had a well-rounded understanding of color.







One of the favorite projects of Housing and Design class is to make their own house. Students worked in groups and picked their favorite style house and recreated the façade using a shoebox. They gained an understanding that different housing facades represent various architectural periods and styles.





Parenting Skills:

Real Care Babies! Taking care of an infant is easy, isn't it??? The students in Mrs. Pavinich's Parenting Skills classes get to see for themselves, sort of. Delaware Valley High School is fortunate to have the "Real Care Baby" program as a component of the Parenting Skills class. This program has been a part of our curriculum for over 25 years. The students practice with the "robot babies" in class for about a week before they take the baby home for the weekend. During the weekend simulation the students rock, feed, burp, change, and care for the baby. This experience helps the high school students realize what a huge responsibility having a baby really is.





Maslow's Hierarchy of Human Needs: Students stacked cups with words and phrases on them that related to the 5 levels of Maslow's Hierarchy. They needed to work together to determine which words fit best into each level of the hierarchy.



Makin' Babies Genetics Project: The students did a coin flipping activity to determine which traits their "baby" would have. Then they drew their baby with the appropriate physical traits.



Learning about the 4 areas of Development: On bring your kid to work day Mrs. Pavinich's children did a development activity with her Parenting Skills classes. They discussed fine and gross motor skills, and Physical, Emotional, Social, and Cognitive development.





Baby Food Taste Testing: The students in Parenting Skills did a blind baby food taste testing activity. We started with typical first foods and progressed to teething puffs and wafers.



Freshman Seminar:

The incoming freshmen learn the layout of the high school campus, locate certain classrooms, and become familiar with staff members during their Scavenger Hunt. Freshmen are encouraged to collaborate with their peers while promoting teamwork. This is a great activity to start the new year off!

College Fair

The Delaware Valley High School Counseling Department continues to have an ongoing commitment to building relationships with various colleges and programs of post-secondary education. On October 6th, roughly 45 institutions of higher learning visited DVHS to meet with juniors and seniors to discuss their institution with prospective students. Here, our students had a face-to-face encounter with college representatives to ask one on one questions and gain contact at the college or university that interests them. Community/Junior colleges, technical institutes, liberal arts colleges, universities, and military academies were represented at this event. Staff were encouraged to support the event by wearing their college gear and foster college discussions with students.

Financial Aid Night

On October 4, Michael Burke from PHEAA spoke to senior parents regarding Financial Aid for their students. Topics included but were not limited to higher education costs, types of financial aid available and how to apply for financial aid. All information was also posted to the high school guidance webpage for anyone unable to attend the presentation.

Junior Parent Information Night

Junior Parent Informational Night was held on April 4. This is an informational session for Juniors and their parents regarding life after High School. We review the different paths typically taken and what next steps are required. We briefly review the process of applying to Higher Education and what that entails. We also highlight our "College Information" section on the website which is a wealth of information including timelines and tutorial videos.

College Applications

The 11/12 Counseling Office, using Naviance, processed approximately 1319 college applications for the Class of 2024.

Pathways to Graduation

Each 11/12 school counselor tracks the students on their caseloads with their corresponding Keystone testing scores. If a student does not have passing Keystone scores, the counselor works with the student and parents to fulfill an alternate pathway to graduate. Sometimes this can involve schedule changes for specific courses and grade requirements, additional college applications, alternate assessments (SAT, ACT, NOCTI, ASVAB), industry credentials, or community service projects.

Dual Enrollment

The Dual Enrollment program allows high school juniors and seniors to take college courses while still enrolled in a traditional high school program. Courses taken are

usually freshman-level courses which can be transferable to colleges, allowing students a significant start in their first year. Delaware Valley had 253 students participate in the dual enrollment program with local colleges. These colleges included Lackawanna College, Keystone College, Sussex County Community College, Johnson College, and Luzerne County Community College.

High school counselors keep track of student athlete's academic requirements in accordance with the NCAA guidelines. We review the requirements for each division to track core course GPAs and make sure the students have what they need to meet the expectations of the NCAA.

Support Groups Offered

Support groups are offered at all levels and vary by school and student need. Groups that are offered include: Academic Success, Anger Management, Changing Families, Coping Skills, Conflict Resolution, dealing with Anxiety, Diversity, Girls Empowerment, Go Girls, Grief, Health Esteem, Healthy Choices, Healthy Relationships, Organizational Skills, Peer/Friendships, Safe Spaces, Self-Advocacy, Self-Care, Self Esteem, Social Skills, Stress Management, Transition to Middle School, Transition to High School, and Women's Empowerment.

Classroom Instruction and Meetings

Classroom instruction is part of the Elementary School Counseling curriculum. School Counselors and Social Workers offer other classroom instruction and meetings that take place at the secondary level. Elementary classroom instruction topics covered include Bullying, Career Education, Coping Skills, Effective Communication, Feelings, Goal Setting, Good Touch/Bad Touch, Healthy Choices, Problem Solving, Safety, Self-Awareness, Stranger Danger, and Test Taking Skills. Secondary level topics include Career Readiness with Artifact Completion, Child Abuse and Mandated Reporting, Conflict Resolution and Peer Mediation, CTE tour introduction, CTE Information Session, Healthy Relationships, Scheduling Process, Senior College Application Process.

Instructional Support Team and Student Assistance Program

School Counselors and School Social Workers work closely to identify and help students in need of academic or personal/ social assistance. As members of the team, they collect and analyze data and work with teachers and families to develop a plan for student success.

Student Attendance Improvement Plans

The School Counseling Department worked with students and families to create an attendance plan for any student with truancy or excessive absenteeism. The goal is to help support families with any obstacles they may have in successful student attendance.

School Assessment Coordinators

DVSD School Counselors serve as School Assessment Coordinators for the Pennsylvania System of School Assessments. Secondary school counselors serve as the School Assessment Coordinators for the Keystone Exams. In addition, high school counselors coordinate the AP Exams, PSAT, ASVAB and NOCTI exams. DDPS students made a banner to wish the students of DDES good luck on the PSSA's.





Special Education

The role of the school counselor within the special education department is essential. School counselors serve as case managers for students with a 504 Agreement. This includes gaining permissions to evaluate, completing the evaluation, and holding a meeting with parents, writing the 504 and distribution of the agreement. High school counselors also serve as gifted case managers including progress monitoring as well. School counselors coordinate the transfer IEP meetings, serve as LEA for IEP meetings, and generate the necessary paperwork for initiating special education evaluations.

Social Media

The School Counselors continue to embrace social media as a form of communication with students and families. X and Instagram are utilized at the high school level. Class Dojo was a favorite platform used by Elementary Counselors. These were used for students and/or parent notification as upcoming events and news warranted. Schoology was also used to communicate in a variety of ways. Information was able to be communicated to all or a few students regarding college-based information, upcoming testing, building initiatives and announcements. Posts such as Motivational Monday, Wellness Wednesday and Fun Friday were also present. The Counseling Department webpages are maintained, and information is updated to be used as a helpful resource.






Career Readiness Standards with Smart Futures

Delaware Valley has continued to utilize the benefits of the Smart Futures Program for the Career Standards. Members of the Counseling Department conducted career lessons and career groups to help introduce our students to the program. The School Counselors maintained and oversaw the Pennsylvania Career Readiness Standards. Students are required to generate six artifacts in grades 3-5 and 6-8, and eight artifacts in grades 9-11. Counselors maintain these artifacts and report completion to Pennsylvania Information Management System (PIMS) for each student.

Career Day 2024

In October, students in the 8th grade participated in our annual Career Day. Both Middle Schools had the opportunity to meet with a guest speaker and learn about different careers. Topics discussed by each presenter included their interests at the middle school age, what drew them to their profession, type and amount of education required, positive and negative aspects of the career, what a typical day is like, related careers and professions. Each presenter also allowed the students to ask their questions. In addition to the live presentations, DDMS students also viewed different careers through personal video presentation. The videos were shown throughout the day giving students an opportunity to learn about new and different careers.



Delaware Valley High School held Career Day for all sophomore students on May 17th. This event provided students with an excellent opportunity to meet professionals working in their fields of interest and discuss course planning, college choices, and career outlooks. DVHS hosted a variety of local professionals this year from the career clusters. Our presenters provided visual presentations, handouts, and unique opportunities to be directly involved with their professions, in addition to fielding various

questions from students about their careers. The generosity of all our contributors makes this a truly unique experience for our Delaware Valley students. This experience will help drive our students' immediate class choices and future career aspirations.

Collaboration

The counseling department has a wide variety of duties and responsibilities. The heart of our work is supporting students in their academic, personal/social and career journey. The counseling departments across all schools were vigilant and supportive to their students, families, and staff. Students were offered school resources that included tutoring, self-help groups, re-entry plans, as well as individual sessions to encourage academic engagement for success. This included collaboration with community agencies and other services available to students. School counselors coordinate homebound services and in home instruction when applicable, as well as report homelessness and work to help support families in need.

Start with Hello

DVSD joined thousands of schools and youth organizations across the country to bring Start with Hello to our schools. This is part of the Sandy Hook Promise to be kind to others and not make students feel left out but more included in their school. Students had fun as they shared kindness throughout our schools by giving compliments and wearing green for Sandy Hook.



The elementary schools additionally celebrated **HEY DAY** which involved wearing a "Hello my name is..." tag and being encouraged via morning announcements to introduce themselves or speak to others who they do not know or want to know better <u>Suicide Prevention</u>

The School Counseling Department is committed to the safety of our students. Counselors and Social Workers must speak with students who express concern, screen their level of safety, and make appropriate referrals for further care or assessment. Counselors and Social Workers conducted Risk Assessments throughout the year and collaborated with families for support.





Bully Prevention & Unity Day

Each building participated in Bully Prevention Month in October including Unity Day. A wide variety of activities and events took place including anti-bullying poster contest, daily announcements, bulletin boards, and classroom lessons all related to types of bullying, statistics, and resources. A Spirit Week was also held to embrace who you are, encourage an empathetic point of view, promote acceptance and inclusion, and being an upstander against bullying.





Lacey Batista, School Counselor, organized the America 250PA event at DDPS. This was established by the state government to plan and coordinate events to commemorate America's 250 anniversary in 2026. This is a Pre-K -4th grade classroom visitation program with volunteers reading the book "K is for Keystone," an age-appropriate Pennsylvania A-Z history book. In addition, local mascots visit each classroom at the conclusion of the reading portion with the distribution of swag bags.







Partner Work

The Dingman Delaware Primary School Counselor partnered with Pennsylvania State Police and our School Police Officer. Assisting Officer Kat (SPO) and Trooper Made (PSP) in the Eddie Eagle Gun Safety Program during guidance classes. Students learn a song "stop, don't touch, run away, tell a grown up." We act out different scenarios during the class to make it fun and engaging.



"Positive Behavior Pets" were introduced to the DDPS Guidance classes. These "friends" visit students during class that exhibit these behaviors.







DDPS hosted an after-school club of 3 session Story Time & Crafts for first graders. We read a different story each time with a craft that went along with it (painting bird houses, planting, and rock painting).





Positive School Wide Behavior

As part of the DDPS positive school wide behavior incentive, students who show "purple" behavior means they go above and beyond the DV 5 and what is expected of them. They are awarded a purple necklace, and they get their photo taken for our Purple Warrior Wall of Fame.





Mental Health Awareness Month

May is Mental Health Awareness Month. The district bonded together to support the awareness and reduce the stigma of mental health in the community. On May 22, Mental Health Awareness Day students and staff wore green to promote the National Alliance of Mental Illness's theme of "Take the Moment". School Spirit Week included daily themes based on different coping skills. Daily announcements were made to students.





School Social Work

At the High School, the School Social Worker had over 700 contacts with approximately 170 different students. The contacts were both individually and in support groups. The School Social worker ran 2 full-year groups for about 16 students. The groups were Diversity, which dealt with the issues concerning DV's LGBTQ population and Women's Empowerment, where young women were encouraged to deal with life issues in a way that validates them as a female. The School Social Worker assisted in the suicide risk assessments of 10 students, which ranged from simple screenings to referrals to emergency rooms for more in-depth evaluation. Peer mediation was continued this school year, where 11 new peer mediators were trained to mediate conflicts among their peers. The School Social Worker wrote and delivered the training to the students which covered conflict styles, anger triggers, how to deescalate conflicts, and how to appropriately resolve conflict. The School Social Worker supported awareness campaigns for suicide, bullying, and mental health awareness through announcements and posters throughout the school.

- Incorporated music into an organized warm-up and included in throughout several lessons.
- Continued to incorporate Language Arts and Mathematics into the Physical Education classes through Action Based Learning
- Incorporated a hands-on shoe tying lesson to help kids master the skill.
- Incorporated Fire Safety Month into the lesson by creating "fire safety stations: which included "Stop, Drop, and Roll", "Stay Low and GO", and "Jump to Safety"
- PE units included gym safety, soccer, fitness, basketball, cooperation games, cardio drumming, yoga, balancing, and striking.
- Created curriculum- based bulletin boards for all health units using a variety of visual aids.
- Created a "Student Work Wall" to display student work throughout the year.

Highlights DDMS

- Physical Education units included soccer, volleyball, pickleball, badminton, floor hockey, table tennis, and basketball. Game activities are taught between units as well as PACER test conditioning to increase cardio-respiratory endurance. The goal of PE is to learn the rules and skills associated with team sports, lifelong recreational activities, and to improve overall health and fitness.
- PE units were approximately 2 weeks long: the first week focused on skill development and the second week focused on rules, etiquette, and tournament play.
- All 6th, 7th, and 8th grade students were educated using the "Too Good for Drugs" health curriculum as well as other supplemental lessons. The focus in health education is to improve all aspects of the health triangle.
- The 6th grade field day is organized by Mrs. Snyder and consists of various activities including a Capture the Football competition, Paper Airplane competition, Water Balloon Toss, Kickball competition, Free Your Friend Competition, Relay Races, and Table Tennis.
- The 7th grade field day is organized by Mr. Holdredge and consists of kickball, Capture the Football, Water Balloon Toss, Gold Rush, Recreational Games, Scooter Relays, and Free Your Friends.

- Chief Moglia and Officer Gaughan continue to assist in teaching the "Too Good for Drugs" curriculum to all 9th grade health classes. This is an interactive and hands-on curriculum that uses a variety of learning strategies to teach topics such as assertive behavior, effective communication, building healthy relationships, refusal skills, decision making skills, and conflict resolution skills.
- The DVHS seniors are ready to save lives! Would you know what to do in a cardiac, breathing, or first aid emergency? The correct answer could help save a life! With a hands-on approach to learning, the Health-12 curriculum gives our seniors these skills.
- The DVHS PE department continues to offer the following elective courses:
 Physical Fitness and Training, Officiating Team and Individual Sports, and
 Leadership and Adventure Activities. These courses enhance the required
 physical education curriculum by giving the students an opportunity to go more
 in-depth on various topics.
- DVHS introduced a new elective PE class entitled Peer Inclusion PE. This class provides a unique opportunity for students with and without disabilities to come together and participate in various activities. Students collaborate with one another and participate in team and individual sports as well as fitness activities.
- The Leadership and Adventure Activities class hosted Leadership Days at DVES.
 DVHS students lead the DVES students through various cooperative games and activities.
- The Leadership and Adventure Activities class went on a field trip to East Stroudsburg University's Stony Acres to participate in various low initiatives and high ropes activities.

- All 10th and 11th grade students continued to use the "Smart Futures" program to plan future career paths. Students research different colleges, areas of study, financial plans, and interview skills to prepare them for post-graduation.
- Athletic Training students took a field trip to Kings College in Wilkes Barre, PA to see the gross anatomy lab, participate in taping and wrapping labs, and practice measurements and assessments in the exercise and sports medicine fields.
- The PE department, in conjunction with the Student Council and the Class Officers, hosted a fall and a spring Spirit Games competition. This annual tradition pits class against class to compete in contests such as Tug of War, Human Hungry Hippos, Musical Chairs, and Balloon Pop Relay.
- The Physical Fitness and Training classes honored veterans on Veterans Day and Memorial Day by completing HERO WODS in class. They also had Sergeant Corey Johnston, Marine Recruiter, come to class and run a Combat Fitness Test (CFT). This is one of two annual fitness tests that the Marine Corps runs each year and the students enjoyed the challenge of completing it.

AV Usage

The Library department assisted the Technology department in getting the students 1:1 with a device (chromebook, iPad, laptop, etc.) The library department also helped to facilitate and track any damages or technical problems with the day-to-day use of the school supplied devices.

Highlights:

DDPS: Mr. Lehman completed many library activities and will be retiring this year.







DDPS Gifted:

The gifted kids completed a variety of STEAM activities throughout the school year. At the conclusion of the year, DDPS was up to 5 gifted learners.

DVES: Various reading initiatives were pushed for students to enhance their knowledge and love of reading. Students were able to access the library throughout the day along with class book checkout times and during specifically scheduled library classes. Accomplished all other tech and chromebook issues and assisted when needed. Accomplished and all other library expectations and duties. Accomplished duties assigned by building administrator.

DVES Gifted: Student learning was met through their specific GIEP goals. Students were exposed to additional learning through a hands-on experience at the Steamtown Aquarium.

DDES: Various library contests and reading incentives throughout the year, extensive weeding of collection, daily checkouts (individual and whole class), liaison with technology for Chromebook maintenance/repairs, instruction on use of library catalog and focused effort to recommend books for students based on personalities, likes/dislikes, genres, authors and series.

DDES Gifted: All year focus on higher-order thinking skills and STEAM activities; field trip to Lacawac Sanctuary on May 9. Individual SMART goals/projects including foreign language learning, 3-D design and printing, mathematics, science and engineering; literature study, creative writing and student-led discussions. 20 students are now in the Gifted program at DDES.

SES: There were various library and reading contests in SES library throughout the year ranging from decorating pumpkin contests to finding golden tickets in library books. We hosted two book fairs in the library this year. At the end of the year, we hosted an Extravaganza Night. This included a movie directly after school for students. We had 179 enrolled for the movie. Following the movie, PTA hosted a Taco Dinner (191 people enrolled), Art department hosted their art show and face painting, 4th grade parents hosted a bake sale, and the library hosted the book fair.

Throughout the year, the library supported technology and chromebook maintenance and repairs while continuing to teach library classes and support student book checkouts and various class novels. We also made sure various activities were photographed throughout the year. The school website and Shohola Facebook page were managed through the library.

SES Gifted: Students completed a research project on aquatic life. As a culminating activity, SES and DVES students traveled to the Electric City Aquarium in Scranton, where they were able to experience some of the animals they researched.

DDMS: The DDMS library encourages students to read with a variety of book displays with four to six different displays every month. The students were also invited to design their own bookmarks during School Library Month in April. There were 29 submissions. The top three winners received Amazon gift cards with three runner ups tied for fourth. All bookmarks were then made available for all students to take home. The DDMS Library also helps to manage all chromebook related problems working together with the tech department to make sure all students have continual access to technology. Mrs. Rachel Goldstein worked with the team from Learnics to learn about and incorporate their software at the middle school level. Learnics is a tool to help during the research process to help students save interesting notes and create bibliographies. Goldstein also participated in IU 20's CONOR library networking meeting, meeting with vendors and getting Al training. She also attended the PSLA 50th Anniversary Conference in April and joined the Lit Review Committee.

DDMS Gifted: The DDMS Gifted students learned about different food cultures by making sushi, trying different types of tea, and making acorn pancakes. The students also learned about Photoshop and began planning an escape room to share with their peers. They started by learning different types of codes and ciphers and practiced with several different types of escape room examples.

DVMS Ongoing Library Activities:

- Supervising the library for student and faculty use (book selection and check-out, make-up tests/quizzes, Internet research, and other computer-related activities)
- Selecting, ordering, & processing of new books, A/V equipment, magazines, & periodicals
- Developing enthusiasm & interest in reading to promote a school-wide reading culture
- Working cooperatively with technology department to manage and distribute chromebooks, providing students access to the network, and troubleshooting assistance
- Gathering of materials for faculty (including assembling a cart of books on particular topics for students to use while researching)
- Teaching gifted students 2 periods a week, including writing their Gifted Individualized Education Plans (GIEPs)

DVMS Gifted:

The gifted pull-out program includes a mix of creative exercises, small projects, reasoning skills, and other learning activities such as logic puzzles. Puzzles build on verbal/linguistic and logical/mathematical learning styles. Literacy skills are reinforced by thinking creatively about language. Critical and creative thinking skills are incorporated and acquired.

Using the Renzulli Learning Profile, each student's unique abilities, interest areas, learning styles, & expression styles were identified. Learning activities were matched to each student's learning profile.





DVHS: Outside of the normal check in/check out of library books, chromebooks, and textbooks, the DVHS Learning Commons experienced a lot of traffic this school year including students, faculty, staff, and community members.

- Multiple classes utilized the spaces that the Learning Commons offers throughout the year, such as the SmartBoard and white board tables for a more interactive and immersive learning environment.
- Many different English and Social Studies classes found the Learning Commons to be an ideal location to work on projects or research papers, utilizing our computers and vast catalog of resources.

- The private and professional office spaces within the Learning Commons allowed for faculty and staff alike to host meetings with individuals from the greater DV community, such as parents.
- The space has been used amply as an accommodating and stress-free testing environment for students who were diligently taking their AP, NOCTI, Keystone, and PSAT exams.
- The instructional assistant who facilitates the daily functions of the Learning Commons worked in tandem with the technology department to manage and distribute chromebooks and assist in troubleshooting for students.
- The instructional assistant who facilitates the daily functions of the Learning Commons worked tirelessly to make the Learning Commons a more welcoming and inviting space for everyone in the DV community.
 - This was done by consistently redesigning and redecorating the variety of book display cases to represent different seasons, holidays, populations, ethnicities, and cultures.
 - Host students during all lunch periods so that they may have a less overwhelming space to complete work while they enjoy their lunch.
 - Additions of decor and furniture pieces to create a feeling of comfort and productivity
 - Advises students who utilize the Learning Commons for "After-School Library", Monday through Thursday until 4:30 pm each week.

DVHS Math Peer Tutoring Program

Every Wednesday after school, our very own DVHS math students, primarily in honors and AP courses, tutor their peers who are currently struggling in their math courses. These students volunteer their time and can put these blocks of time towards community service hours that are needed for the National Honor Society. The club is supervised by DVHS math teachers. The students who come to be tutored benefit from the one-on-one tutoring time that they receive every week. Peer tutoring runs all year from October to June. This year, we had 10 peer tutors and over 100 students who were tutored.

As we approach the end of the year, our "Math Tutor of the Year" award goes to sophomore Dominick Agron for his dedication and commitment each week. He has been a fantastic, consistent tutor for the past two years. Thank you, Dominick!

Pi Day Celebrated in AP Calculus AB

Did you know that Pi is the ratio of the circumference of a circle to its diameter? Students in AP Calculus AB enthusiastically created an atmosphere of curiosity in the classroom on Pi Day, also known as March 14th. They answered trivia on Pi, learning that we currently know the first 62.8 trillion digits of pi, thanks to a supercomputer that crunched the number for more than 100 days. The passion for learning mathematics was complete with the eating of several varieties of pie.





Math 24 Competition at DVMS









How good are you at mental math? Do you find it easy to compute numbers mentally? If you're a mental math genius, then Math 24 is your game! Students from Mrs. Gonzalez's, and Mrs. Scott's classes attended a Math 24 competition in Easton. alongside students from schools from all around the area. It was an exciting day for these 6th grade students, as they participated in three thrilling rounds of competition. For each round, there was a set of cards for the proctor to flip over. Each card presented four numbers that must be added, subtracted, multiplied, or divided to equal the number 24. The students had only a short 15 seconds to find each solution! Some students were able to provide an answer within an impressive three seconds! The first round consisted of single digit numbers, the second round included double-digit numbers, and the third round was a variable round. The variable round challenged the students to find a number that satisfied two sets of four numbers, rather than one. The amount of effort and diligence displayed by all the students in the competition was outstanding. The combination of their hard work and mental math abilities proudly represented DVMS! DDMS After School Tutoring Program

The DDMS After School Math Tutoring Program was a successful outreach this school year. Ms. Kluge, Ms. Davidson and Ms. Howey started the year with math tutoring for all grades on October 3 and met with the students every other week to help with math difficulties and PSSA preparation. A total of 150+ students were seen in tutoring throughout the school year.

Mu Alpha Theta Mathematics Honor Society

Delaware Valley High School had 30 members in Mu Alpha Theta, the national mathematics honor society. Students competed throughout the year in Weekend Challenges, solving five problems each weekend covering a wide range of topics in mathematics. The top scorer was Jessie Dijan for the second year in a row. Christian Perunsky earned second place, and Jacob Albaugh was in third place. Some members also participated in the AMC 12 competition in November.

AMC 10/12

The AMC 10/12 competition was held on November 14. Forty-eight students in grades 9 through 12 competed in the contest, answering 25 multiple choice questions in 75 minutes without the use of a calculator. The top scorers for the AMC 12 competition were: 1st – Nixon Kameen, 2nd – Bennett Nielsen, and tied for 3rd – Eunice Choi and Addie Domanico. The top scorers for the AMC 10 competition were: 1st – Matthew Marotta, 2nd - Jocelyn Alveari, and 3rd – Nathaniel Carso.

Dingman-Delaware Primary School (DDPS)





To kick off the school year, the DDPS Title I Reading Team celebrated students who completed the Summer Reading Challenge. Students were challenged to read and collect "book bucks" around the community during the summer. Students who completed the challenge were able to shop in the reading room with the book bucks they collected, as well as have lunch with Ms. Butaitis.

This year the DDPS Reading theme was Dr. Seuss. The reading team used this theme to motivate and encourage students to read. In the fall, DDPS had a Trunk-or-Treat. The team dressed up as Dr. Seuss book characters, decorated a trunk, and handed out bookmarks and candy. The team was able to get to know and interact with DDPS families, while the students trick-or-treated.

This year, the reading team not only held their Fall Open House, but they met with parents during conferences in November and after mid-year testing. The families of new students were invited to meet the team to review data. They were given activities and strategies they could use with their children at home to support reading progress. In December, students were challenged to read over winter break and approximately one hundred students participated. Students were invited to enjoy hot chocolate and listen to Ms. Butaitis read a winter story about snowmen.

DDPS celebrated Read Across America Month, but this year, the reading team added a weekly mystery reader. Classrooms had the opportunity to guess the mystery readers and win prizes. The reading team ended the month with a schoolwide hat parade. Students and staff created hats based on their favorite book. In the spring, the reading team participated in kindergarten registration. Jen and Elina met with incoming

kindergarten parents and provided them with hands-on materials to get their children ready for school in the fall.

It was another exciting year at DDPS. The reading team wrapped up the school year with a local author's visit. All Title I parents were invited to participate with their children. Students met author, Lindsay Barrett George, participated in a read aloud and drawing activity that

was geared for their age level. They were sent home with a signed book and a summer reading incentive.

Delaware Valley Elementary School (DVES)

Delaware Valley Elementary School's Title I Reading Department held a Summer Reading Incentive event in September to celebrate students who completed the Summer Reading Challenge. Students read and filled out summer reading calendars to earn an educational and age-appropriate reading game.

In October, the reading specialists held their Fall Title I Parent Engagement Meeting to explain the Title I program, testing procedures, and instruction that would be used with the Title I students. They offered many tips and suggestions for parents to use at home to help their children with reading and homework. They shared their school's updated website as a reference to be used during the school year.



In the beginning of the year, Title I students conferenced with their reading teacher to discuss their various scores on their DIBELS tests. Each student identified areas where they needed improvement and set a reading goal. Each week, after progress monitoring was completed, the student marked the score on a tracking sheet. Once a student hit his/her individualized goal, he/she was presented with a certificate with his/her picture. It was placed on the GOAL CRUSHERS bulletin board. The achievement picture was also sent home to the child's family members. The student then reevaluated his/her progress and set another reading goal.

DVES celebrated Read Across America in March. Dr. Seuss inspired activities included daily read-alouds, estimation contest, sock decorating contest, and dressing up as Seuss characters. Students had the chance to listen to daily read-alouds and guess the mystery reader during our DVES Masked Reader Series. Students were encouraged to read and learn more about Dr. Seuss and his many books.



Spring Parent Engagement Meeting and BINGO Night was held in April. The reading specialists provided educational reading BINGO games and offered suggestions to help promote reading and writing during the summer to prevent a slide in skills. All the activities and valuable links were posted on the DVES Reading website. The reading specialists had a representative from the Pike County Public Library discuss the summer programs available to PCPL members. Parents and students were given the opportunity to register for library cards.



In June, we will bid farewell to Mandi Lambert after 35 years of service to the Delaware Valley Elementary School. She was an integral part of the Reading Department and will be greatly missed by both students and staff.



Shohola Elementary School (SES)







This year the Shohola Reading Team kicked off the year with school-wide DIBELS assessments and a push-in model of instruction to support the classroom teachers and the students. To better meet the needs of their diverse population, the reading team implemented additional multisensory programs, including Heggerty and UFLI. The UFLI Foundations Program provided students with new and engaging manipulatives to support their developing phonics skills.

The reading team continued many SES traditions, such as celebrating Read Across America Week with fun Dr. Seuss activities. This year, they added a special Storybook Character Day to reach authors beyond Dr. Suess.

The reading team celebrated the AR Millionaires, along with students who met the 100 Book Club Challenge and added a 200 Book Club Award. Recognition was shown with Facebook shout-outs, bulletin board photos, end-of-year certificates/medals, and specially designed t-shirts. The theme for this year was "DONUT Stop Reading." Two Reading Rocket Award were created to recognize Title I students who made the most growth the school year.



To wrap up another successful year, Title I students were invited to an ice cream social and movie event to celebrate their accomplishments. Parents stayed to meet with the reading specialists to discuss summer learning and were presented with materials to combat summer slide.



Dingman-Delaware Elementary School (DDES)

DDES hosted a Family Literacy Night for the Title I families. It was a night full of fun, learning, and PSSA preparation. The reading specialists discussed PSSA preparation strategies, reviewed the Family Engagement Policy, and gave a summary of the programs that students qualified to enter. The night ended with "LET'S GLOW READING FAMILY NIGHT." Parents worked with their children on the English/Language Arts skills they learned throughout the year, such as text structure, figurative language, vocabulary, literacy terms, comprehension, and fluency. The reading specialists showed families how games and discussions could help students. Students left with a writing table to continue to build writing and spelling skills at home. They received a timer to build fluency and a highlighter for metacognition.

Title I groups participated in a Reading March Madness Competition. Students worked together to read and answer comprehension questions and end with a Text-Dependent Analysis (TDA) prompt to earn points. Following this competition, Title I students worked on TDA Friday workshops with the reading teachers. The reading specialists led a school-wide writing competition with Young Writers and had 182 students chosen to publish their work in a book.













Delaware Valley Middle School (DVMS)

During the month of February, students in Mrs. Masker's Literacy class read about important figures in history who had not been given credit for their achievements during their time but were recognized much later for their contributions. Students read about inventor Garrett Morgan and were assigned to write a newspaper article containing the facts. Students pretended to go back in time to the event in 1916 to tell the factual story as it should have been told originally, praising Garrett Morgan for his heroism. Students learned how to format a newspaper article, then took their printed copies and placed them in a coffee-soak to age the papers to make them look like old-time newspapers. Student work was proudly displayed on a bulletin board at the end of the F-wing.


The Engineering 2/Principles of Engineering class toured the Valley Energy Center in Middletown, NY as part of their unit on Energy Generation.



Students started their unit on the Struggle for Equality with Pop-Up Notes on African Americans.




Students finished the Women's Rights section by completing a pendant for a famous female in history.

Also under the direction of Mr. Barnett, The Robert Lewis Presentation, expanded its audience with the addition of cross-curricular classes Forensics and Sociology, and two additional Peace Studies classes. Previously, and in the future, Journalism has/will be attending. The Robert Lewis Presentation was done by the Hon. Micheal Worden who based his presentation on his book, *Lynched By a Mob*, which tells the story of a man that was wrongfully persecuted and experienced social injustice at the hands of an angry mob. 



On November 15th, 54 Spanish students, accompanied by Mr. Cotroneo and Mrs. Krasulski, traveled to El Repertorio Español in New York City to see a play entitled "La Gringa," which is about a girl living in New York who returns to Puerto Rico to learn about her heritage, her family, and the world's view of Puerto Ricans. The play was conducted entirely in Spanish. Afterwards, the students were introduced to the actors in the play and encouraged to ask questions about what they saw and heard.





On December 14th, Mr. Cotroneo's AP Spanish students competed in a Spanish version of Chopped by cooking and presenting a dish made by groups in the class. The competition is the culminating project of the AP theme of Beauty and Aesthetics, with the winning team getting a prize from Mr. Cotroneo. The team of Eric Fass, Ritesh Patel, and Karter Peereboom won this year's competition.











In December, students in AP French, French 4 and selected students in French 3 went on a joint field trip with AP Studio Art/Art History students to the Metropolitan Museum of Art in NYC.

- From the sales of the Advent calendar, Elke Miller's German 1 classes donated to Father John's Animal House and to St. Jude Children's Hospital.
- In February, Elke Miller's DVMS German 1 class participated in a class cooking activity (Schnitzel, Spaetzle, braune Sosse, Roesti, Zuericher Geschnetzeltes, and Bratwurst).







• In March, Elke Miller's DVMS French 1 classes baked Tarte aux pommes and cooked crème brulée.









- Students in all French classes celebrated and learned about the traditions of Mardi Gras. Certain classes shared their knowledge with Mrs. Ross' FACS classes, and her classes shared a meal with the French classes.
- DVMS Spanish students participated in "speed dating (citas cortas)" where students spoke with all of their classmates and rotated every minute to get lots of speaking experience. They also listened to music from Marc Anthony, Diego Torres, and La Voz Kids to study grammar and culture as well as. To end the year, students created a comic strip using the Pixton app to recount their last year at DVMS.
- In March, the Advanced Placement Spanish students participated in the National Spanish Contest sponsored by the American Association of Teachers of Spanish and Portuguese. The winners this year were: Erik Fass, Karter Peereboom and Luke Peereboom who merited an Honorable Mention Award, all nationally and regionally.





- Starting in March and ending in April, French students learned about a variety of French-speaking singers from around the world and enjoyed a competitive bracket challenge and learned how to express themselves about music and their opinions about the variety of artists and genres. This competition is both a national and international competition run by a group of volunteers around the world to benefit the French classes of all involved.
- On May 22nd and 23rd, Mrs. Ross and Mr. Wyckoff team taught their Foods A, Foods B, and German 2 classes. Over two days, classes learned about traditional German cuisine and cooked a traditional cookie known as an "Amerikaner". All classes watched videos on how it is traditionally prepared, followed by German students sharing with Foods A and B students the language of original recipe ingredients and directions. Foods A and B students then aided the German 2 students in the proper preparation of the recipe. It was a great success.

Highlights:

- The district added an additional Educational Consultant to assist with academic and behavioral interventions. The Educational Consultant is a BCBA. This was a great benefit to the district as it allowed for a highly valued role in the realm of education to be filled. The knowledge and value that the BCBA brings to the district is priceless. She was able to review FBAs, provide recommendations and guidance on interventions, and provide professional development to staff.
- Technology continues to play a critical role for our students who require augmentative communication. Through the use of iPads, iPods, iPhones, and Chromebooks, students are able to access communication for both social and academic gains.
- DV hosted our 15th annual Special Olympics on May 9th. Students participated in various track and field events. This year, students from Wallenpaupack, Wayne Highlands, North Pocono, Western Wayne, PCDC, and Devereux also participated. Over 270 athletes participated. Our students really enjoyed this event! Parents were also able to get information at the resource fair, which was held at the entrance to the event. Various community agencies that support students and families with special needs were available to speak with parents and give additional information.
- Of the forty-nine seniors who graduated this year, eight will be attending a four-year college, seven will be attending a two-year college, ten will be attending a technical school, nineteen are entering the workforce, two are enlisting in the military, and three are attending a community participation services day program with a local provider.
- Nineteen seniors were found eligible for services through the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation. Twenty-seven underclassmen were found eligible for services and will continue to work with The Office of Vocational Rehabilitation throughout their high school years. The Office of Vocational Rehabilitation can provide services such as Career Counseling, Job Shadows, Community Based Work Experiences, Paid Work Experience, and Driver Training. Students worked with the following agency providers: Community Vocational Services and Youth Advocate Program.
- The community continues to support our students in so many ways! Twelve students participated in Community Based Work Assessments and Paid Work Experiences through the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation at the following employment sites: Balch's Fish Fry, Best Western Inn at Hunt's Landing, Flagship Cinemas, Good Shepherd Church, Keyfood Marketplace, Laurel Grove Florist and Greenhouse, Market 32, May Brothers Landscaping, Sawkill Power Equipment, Tractor Supply, Village Diner, Weis Markets, and Woodloch Pines Golf Maintenance.
- In addition, weekly Community Job Trials for underclassmen took place at Balch's Seafood Restaurant, Goodfella's Italian Restaurant, Flagship Cinemas, Fort Knox Storage, Foundry 42 Coffee Shop, Hampton Inn, Home Depot, Jeff's Garden Shop, Key Food Supermarket, La Posada and Felix's Cantina, Laurel Grove Florist and Greenhouse, Market 32, Matamoras Borough Office, Pike County Humane Society, Pike County Prothonotary Office, NAPA Auto Parts, Shoprite, Tractor Supply, and Walmart Supercenter.

- Students from the 18-21 Transition Program participated in virtual workshops titled Tech for All from October 10- November 14th. Presenters from The Pennsylvania Developmental Disabilities Council facilitated the workshops in the following topics: Building Friendships and Relationships, How to Look for a Job or Volunteering online, Having Fun and Recreation on the Internet, Email, Facebook and Texting, Staying safe on the Internet, Using Zoom and Videoconferencing.
- Seven students attended the field trip to Sussex Community College and The McGuire Technical Education Center on February 27. Students had the opportunity to meet with Admissions, Disability Services, and tour the campus.
- Four students attended a field trip to East Stroudsburg University on April 11.
 Students attended an admissions presentation, received a tour of the campus, and met with the director of the Office of Accessible Services Individualized for Students (OASIS) to discuss how to access accommodations at the post-secondary level
- Five Delaware Valley seniors participated in our reverse job fair on April 9 at the
 Best Western Inn at Hunt's Landing. A reverse job fair is a career fair that flips the
 tables. The Delaware Valley students created presentation boards showcasing their
 resumes and pictures of themselves at various job sites. The employers had the
 opportunity to circulate among the tables and introduce themselves to the students
 seeking employment.

- October 11th How to Access Accommodations at Post-Secondary School.
 Presentation by Jill Ceasar Boyle, M.Ed. Coordinator of Office of Accessible Services Individualized for Students OASIS
- Parents and Staff were invited to attend a virtual presentation by Norma Realpe from Disability Rights PA on November 1st. The presentation reviewed work incentives planning for transition aged youth and an overview of Social Security benefits.
- Parents were invited to attend a virtual presentation on PA ABLE on October 18th,
 October 25th, November 14th, January 23rd, January 30th, and February 22nd. The
 presentation was by Diana Fishlock from the PA Treasury. A PA ABLE account
 gives individuals with qualified disabilities (Eligible Individuals), and their families and
 friends, a tax-free way to save for disability-related expenses, while maintaining
 government benefits.
- Students and Parents were invited to a presentation by The Office of Vocational Rehabilitation (OVR) on March 13. The OVR counselor, Brooke Padavan reviewed the OVR application process and OVR programs and services.
- The Pike County Workforce Development Agency and the Delaware Valley High School sponsored College/Career Night on May 29th. Students and parents had the opportunity to gather information and talk to representatives from 25 colleges, technical schools, community colleges, and several branches of the military. Also in attendance were local employers.
- Parents were provided links to monthly interactive workshops presented by the PA Family Network. Some workshops presented were Waiver Basics, Lifecourse Framework to plan and problem solve, Safety in the Community, and Caregiver Support.

- Students and their families were provided information and applications for the Pike County Workforce Development Agency Summer Youth Employment Program.
- Delaware Valley maintained contact with Community Participation Support Programs including Devereux Pocono Center, Human Resources Center, Inc. and The Pike County Developmental Center. One student attended Devereux Pocono Center. One student attended Human Resources Center, Inc. and one student attended The Pike County Developmental Center as a part of transitioning to the programs after graduation.
- Delaware Valley maintained contact with Carbon Monroe Pike Mental Health and Developmental Services Intake Coordinator and Waiver Coordinator in order to support students and their parents in the planning process of accessing community services after leaving Delaware Valley.

- This year, our department collaborated with IU 20 to assist our gifted case managers. They attended multiple trainings related to gifted procedures, timelines, paperwork, and programs. We will continue to plan gifted education professional development for our gifted case managers, as well as our school psychologists and regular education teachers for the upcoming school year.
- Students at DVHS continue to have a variety of academic choices to meet their needs.
- Students competed in the K'nex STEAM challenge at Northampton Community college. They also completed a wide range of STEAM activities and ended the school year with building and launching water rockets and solid fuel rockets.
- Gifted students started the year with a Design a Food Truck project. They had to create a name, logo, and menu. Once the start-up was complete, they created a 3D model of their Food Truck.
- Students also completed a research project. Students completed research on their topic, created a presentation using Google Slides, presented it to their peers, and then created an assessment based on their presentation.
- This year we also created t-shirts using the Cricut and mini heat press. Students designed their shirts in Cricut Design Space, cut the heat transfer vinyl with the Cricut, and then pressed their shirts.
- Our students went on field trips to the Martin Guitar Factory and the Franklin Institute.

MENTAL HEALTH AND STUDENT SUPPORT SERVICES DR. DIANA BIXBY, Director

One focus of this past school year was to begin to offer more support and training to our school staff and parents regarding mental health and student support services. Our goal is to continue to provide training and support for our staff for the next several years.

Mental Health Professional Development:

A team of administrators attended the Safe and Supportive Learning Environments Conference in Harrisburg, PA August 16th and 17th. We learned about using brainaligned strategies to assist students and staff with regulation, along with other ways to create supportive environments for students.

On August 23rd, DVSD administrators were given a mental health overview training by Thriving Schools. Dr. Cameron Caswell is an Adolescent Psychologist working with parents and students in her practice outside of school. Mrs. Charle Peck is a former high school teacher who is now a social worker. The team has joined together to present information related to helping students, staff, and parents. Our administrative team learned a lot and enjoyed the training.



On August 24, all our secondary teachers, along with our counselors, psychologists, and social workers participated in mental health training with Dr. Cam and Charle from Thriving Schools during our in-service day. It was the beginning of many conversations regarding what our staff and students need to remove obstacles to learning. We are looking forward to continuing to support our teachers through professional development and collaboration on strategies to support our students. Our elementary staff will receive this training on October 9th. We are excited to continue this work in supporting our teachers, students, and parents.

On October 9th, all elementary teachers received training in mental health by Thriving Schools. Now that all teachers in the district have had the training, a focus group is currently being formed for teachers so we can discuss additional needs and create

further professional development for this year. Training for instructional assistants will also be scheduled to occur this year.

Also, during the Act 80-day, Dr. Bixby, along with our counselors and social workers districtwide, met with Erin Stroyan, Pike County CASSP (Child and Adolescent Service System Program) Coordinator through MH/DS (Mental Health/Developmental Services). During their time together, Ms. Stroyan shared the various resources available to students and families in our community. There was further discussion on assisting families to apply for Medical Access, along with improving communication with community agencies and offices. Ms. Stroyan sits on various SAP teams throughout the district and has been an asset in assisting our staff and parents learn about community resources to help our students. We are incredibly thankful for her support!

December 12 and 13th, Parent/guardian trainings on mental health were held via zoom at 7:00 pm. One session covered working with elementary children, and the other session covered strategies for secondary children. The workshops were given by Dr. Camerson Caswell, an adolescent psychologist and trainer through Thriving Schools. Dr. Caswell shared some strategies with parents/guardians to help them with children who have challenging behaviors or to assist with adult/child conflicts. She also gave various tips on how to connect with your child and teen. Dr. Caswell took questions and had discussions around other topics as parents/guardians brought them up. We are going to follow up with additional resources for parents/guardians and continue to look for additional training that will assist us in collaborating with families to assist their children.

January 2nd, during our Act 80 training day, all support professionals were given mental health training facilitated by Ms. Charle Peck from Thriving Schools.

January 18th, Dr. Diana Bixby and Dr. Vivian Bruno prepared and delivered a presentation for the Board on school mental health, suicide prevention and awareness, and bullying.

On April 12th and 13th, Dr. Bixby and Dr. Bruno gave a presentation at "Putting it all Together.... Together" workshop sponsored by Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) and Carbon Monroe Pike Drug and Alcohol. The workshop offered multiple community agencies and providers discussing mental health support for our children. It was a great opportunity to showcase what our school is doing to support our students and learn about additional agencies.

Dr. Bruno attended the School Mental Health - Treating Students K-12 - Session at Harvard Medical School via Zoom. The topics included Motivational Interviewing: Skills for Success and Managing Long-Term Suicidal Ideation in Diverse School Settings.

Ms. Amy Letwinsky, high school social worker, attended a two-day ASIST Suicide Prevention training. She will be sharing information that she learned with fellow colleagues and administrators so we can continue to support our students. She also attended Kutztown's colloquium on suicide and the LGBTQ+ community.

Dr. Bixby hosted the two Mental Health Parent Focus Groups. Dr. Vivian Bruno also attended, and they teamed up to facilitate the group as a representative from the counseling department. The goal of these focus groups is to gather parent input and feedback so we can review concerns and ideas to improve parent communication. We will continue to have collaborative conversations to help our students get the mental health support that they need.

Student Support Professional Development:

On October 11th, teacher representatives from the three secondary buildings, along with Dr. Bixby, took part in a Check-In/Check-Out training via zoom. This was a training offered by CIU 20. Check-In/Check-Out is a Tier 2 intervention, and we are discussing how we can incorporate this evidence-based practice within our district. We are in the process of creating a plan and more staff will be trained as needed.

November 1st-3rd, administrators traveled to Hershey for the <u>2023 PAPBS Network and MTSS Implementers' Forum: Building Community From Science to Practice</u> conference offered by PATTaN. We were able to learn additional intervention strategies, along with various ways to collect data to inform which intervention strategies should be used. Model schools presented on PBIS. The team is already having conversations regarding ways to incorporate what we have learned within our classrooms and interventions.

November 10th and 13th, Dr. Bixby and Mr. Vitale, school psychologist, attended a Restorative Practices training at IU 20 offices. We learned a lot of great information and are collaborating with the IU to determine the next steps for additional training. All three of our educational consultants were trained in the Student Assistance Program (SAP) and can now be members of the SAP team if needed so they can give additional input and support.

April 23rd, Angela Edson, Bereavement Counselor at Joseph T. Quinlan Bereavement Center, offered a parent and staff workshop via zoom to provide grief education and how to support a grieving child.

Dr. Bixby, Mrs. Nielsen, along with other members of the special education department and administration, attended other trainings including "How to Build an Intervention System that Supports All Staff and Students," and the PDE Conference, "Making a Difference: Educational Practices that Work," in Hershey, PA February 28th-March 1st. Various Achieve Academy staff attended trainings throughout the year through PaTTAN. Some training included: AEDY Planning for Success: Efficient and Effective Behavioral Screening and Intervention webinar. These webinars share best practices and allow valuable networking opportunities, multiple Community of Practices webinars, and a webinar reviewing how to complete the Formal Periodic Review paperwork and process. We are still learning and improving in this program, but our kids are responding in a positive way.

Mental Health

September was Suicide Awareness and Prevention Month. Staff and students were asked to wear yellow on Thursdays to bring awareness to this topic. Our social workers reminded our teachers to reach out to school counselors and social workers when they have a concern for a student. The secondary schools also distributed yellow resource cards for students to have as well.

There were multiple meetings with members of the Youth Suicide Prevention Task Force throughout the year to continue the discussion of how to collaborate as a community to assist our students when they are in crisis. The goal of the committee is to coordinate with schools, agencies, emergency rooms, and hospitals to ensure that our children receive the care they need during a crisis. We are looking forward to improving this process to help our students and families. On September 28th, the Pa Suicide Prevention Grant committee also met to continue to discuss collaboration to help our youth. We have also reached out to have continued discussions with community agencies such as YAP, PATHWAYS, VIP, CIU 20, and MH/DS to continue to build positive relationships, brainstorm new ideas and continue collaboration.

May was Mental Health Awareness Month. Dr. Bixby attended the State Capital for HEAL PA's Trauma and Mental Health Awareness Capital Day Campaign to kick off Mental Health Awareness Month. She met with various legislators advocating for mental health and trauma awareness for all children in Pennsylvania and collaborating with members of HEAL PA. DVHS brought speaker Ivy Watts to speak to all students about mental health. All staff and students were encouraged to wear green on May 23. Ms. Letwinsky collaborated with SAC to design a shirt in coordination with Morgan's Message. It was made available to all staff to purchase and wear on Fridays for Mental Health Awareness Month. They raised \$440.00 that was evenly divided between the Northeastern Suicide Prevention Initiative and GAIT. Both charities work directly with DV students and families. Announcements were made daily regarding mental health at the middle schools. At the elementary level, morning announcements were explained in a primary friendly way during spirit week to help share good emotional wellness strategies for our students. Dr. Bruno distributed mental health awareness items in collaboration with Erin Stroyan, MH/DS CASSP coordinator, to various staff members district wide. Announcements were on our main campus marquee and there were also yard signs promoting mental health awareness on all campuses. Our goal is to continue to work with our community, staff, students, and parents to stop the stigma of receiving mental health support when you need it.

Ms. Westfall, an elementary school social worker, was instrumental in creating our flyers and announcements for Mental Health Awareness Month. She continued to meet with groups at DDPS, DDES, and SES. Gabby has great ideas to assist our younger students and families and we are already planning for the next school year! She also attended the Pike County Mental Health Proclamation at the Commissioner's Office on May 1 to kick off Mental Health Awareness Month.

Dr. Bruno attended a Mental Health Wellness Community Conversation in the Wallenpaupack Area School District to network with neighboring schools. She has brought back many ideas that we are hoping to implement next school year. In addition, Dr. Bruno attended an Advisory Board meeting with Children and Youth. She continued to see students at both DVMS and DDMS in groups and individually.

Student Support Services

There were multiple meetings with CIU20 TAC staff to discuss how the IU can assist Delaware Valley in implementing Multi-Tiered Systems of Support (MTSS). Dr. Bixby met with different elementary level personnel to discuss current procedures and interventions for the instructional support team process. Some of the schools are looking to improve their processes in School-Wide Positive Behavior Support. An administrative overview training is planned for October to share information regarding Positive Behavior Support and Multi-Tiered Systems of Support. Some school level teams will be training with CIU 20 training staff to create improvements to their schools' behavior and academic interventions. In this new support services role, Dr. Bixby will be an additional resource when there is a need to intervene with a student in regular education. This includes sitting on Instructional Support Teams (IST) and Student Assistance Program (SAP) teams when needed. She will be assisted by Mrs. Amanda Lawson, our new educational consultant. We collaborate with Mrs. Nielsen and the special education department as we are working on improving the intervention process for students in our district.

October 2nd, staff and students wore blue for World Day of Bullying Prevention. Also, the elementary schools had Anti-Bullying Spirit week from October 16th-20th. October 18th, throughout the district students and staff wore orange to promote unity and acceptance. The elementary schools held their annual unity walk. During this month, there was an anti-bullying poster contest across the district. Elementary students created self-portraits in art and celebrated with the message "It's OK to be Different." Thank you to one of our elementary school social workers, Gabby Westfall, for providing the pictures.







We continue to collaborate with our community behavioral health and student support agencies to decrease barriers for our students and families in receiving mental health services. We met through Systems of Care Leadership Team, Interagency Council, and the Youth Suicide Prevention Taskforce. These meetings took place throughout the school year.

Our social workers led The Great Kindness Challenge-Animal Drive Edition in all school buildings districtwide. Ms. Gabby Westfall, SES, DDPS, and DDES school social worker, led this initiative, while Dr. Vivian Bruno and Ms. Amy Letwinsky also played key roles in this endeavor. Outreach was made to the Pike County Humane Society to gather a list of acceptable donation items. Flyers were made, hung, posted on DOJO, sent home, and posted on social media explaining in a primary and secondary friendly way what the Humane Society is and how they help our local animals. The flier indicated that the Animal Drive was in honor of the Great Kindness Challenge, which was held across the nation. At DDPS, the leadership students assisted with assembling donation boxes and doing morning announcements. At the high school level, Ms. Letwinsky enlisted the help of the Student Council, Rachel's Challenge, and the Interact Club helped to get the word out, and the Swim team raised \$200 with a "coin dive." Staff members also donated to this worthy cause. An incentive at the elementary level was to bring in a picture with their pet (past or present) and the student's picture was hung up on the "Wall of Fame" throughout the month of January.

Our school social workers held a Random Acts of Kindness week during February. DVMS hosts a King and Queen of Kindness where students are nominated by teachers and voted on by students to showcase students who emulate our school culture that includes positive choices, good citizenship and caring about others and our school. At the elementary level, Random Acts of Kindness Spirit Week where teachers asked students to think of a time when someone was kind to them and write it down. The pink/red/white chains were hung in honor of Valentine's Day. Teachers received 27 different "kind acts" (ex: smile at 3 people, volunteer to help a teacher/peer, thank the cafeteria staff) and each day encouraged acting kind or reflecting on kindness.



Our school social workers and counselors continue to run student groups districtwide as well. Some groups that occurred include women empowerment, diversity, resiliency, grief, coping skills, student success, growth mindset, social skills, anger management,

and organization. We continue to look at ways to improve the assistance we offer to students and create groups based on student needs. Parent permission is required to participate in a group.

April 27th the DVSD school nurses hosted a community wellness fair. There were 38 vendors in attendance ranging from financial, mental health as well as physical wellbeing. The fair was attended by various members of the community. The people who attended found the fair to be very beneficial as well as informative. Many of the community members as well as the vendors thanked us for hosting the wellness fair and are excited to return next year.

Achieve Academy

Achieve Academy began with some changes for the school year. Students came to school at 2:00 pm and met with Dr. Bixby in an education group. They also met with Dr. Bruno, Achieve Academy social work in individual and group counseling during this time. Students began to learn about their brain and nervous system to assist them in learning self-regulation strategies. Our positive behavior system has begun and students are being recognized for their strengths, following the rules, and working towards their behavior goals.

Dr. Bruno met with students in groups and individually when needed throughout the program hours. All students in Achieve Academy receive at least 2.5 hours of counseling per week. When students enter and exit Achieve Academy, there is an intake and exit meeting with members of the Achieve Academy team, the building level team, the guardian, and the student. For students who may be placed longer than 45 days, the team still meets every 45 days to review goals and determine if the current interventions are appropriate. These meetings are very helpful in creating a plan of success for our students. Mr. Brian Niemotka, our school psychologist, also participates in the intake meetings to assist in determining behavior goals that will be implemented during the course of the student's education in Achieve Academy.


• The Boys Basketball Team finished with a record of 8-14. Tommy Parker was recognized as a *First-Team Lackawanna League All-Conference* selection.

The DV Foundation enjoyed a rewarding and overall successful 2023-24. The organization enjoyed a re-branding, complete with a new logo, slogan and signage. Most importantly, the foundation made a commitment to increase its support for the school and local communities.
