Curriculum Map

Overview:

Orchestra is a course in which students expand their musical understanding and performance skills related to string instruments (violin, viola, cello, or string bass) through individualized instruction, large group rehearsals, small group lessons (3-4 per marking period), and required concert performances.

While this course is designed for students who have previous instrumental experience, students with no prior instrumental experience may participate upon completing a lesson regimen of 4-6 lessons prior to the semester in which they wish to participate.

Time/Credit for the Course: Full Year

Unit 1: Technique, ongoing Understanding of:

Unit 2: Tone Quality, Pitch, and Intonation, ongoing Understanding of:

Introduction to shifting and vibrato Tuning, use of the tension pegs Bow control (spiccato)

Unit Name: Technique

Shifting into 3rd position (violin / viola)

Shifting into 4th position (cello)

Double Stops (one string open)

Intermediate finger patterns (high 3)

Articulation markings (staccato, marcato, legato)

Objectives:

- Students will show positions of fingerboard as listed above
- Students will construct double stops with one open string and one fingered
- Student will show controlled spiccato bowing

• Students will analyze articulation in written music to apply appropriate bowing technique (either detaché or spiccato)

<u>Unit Name</u>: Tone Quality, Pitch, and Intonation

• **Anchors**: A1.1.1.2

• Eligible Content:

Tuning the instrument with each note played on the keyboard (pegs and fine tuners)
Adjusting placement of finger on fingerboard given a correct pitch
Major/minor scales up to 3 flats/sharps and 2 octaves
Using bow weight, speed, and placement to create dynamic contrast and adjust tone quality

Objectives:

DOK Level 1 (Recall)

• Students will list notes required to play scales listed above

DOK Level 2 (Skill/Concept)

- Student will modify finger placement to match a pitch they are hearing
- Students will show ability to tune their instrument using fine tuners and tuning pegs

DOK Level 4 (Extended Thinking)

 Students will apply concepts of bow control in order to perform with dynamic contrast and beautiful tone

Time signatures with eighth note as the foundation (6/8)

Syncopation

16th notes

Performing in a chamber group (no conductor or metronome)

Objectives:

DOK Level 1 (Recall)

- Students will define both numbers in a time signature
- Students will identify and define 16th notes

DOK Level 2 (Skill/Concept)

• Students will show successful performance of passages with 16th notes

DOK Level 4 (Extended Thinking)

- Students will analyze rhythmic patterns in music with counting syllables (1 e & a, 2 e & a, etc.)
- Students will apply concepts relating to tempo and rhythm to perform in a chamber group with no conductor or metronome

• Students will recall the names of famous composers and the composers whose music they are performing

• Student will show successful performance of music in various styles

• Students will compare famous orchestral pieces from a variety of time periods

- Students will create short melodies to be performed on their instrument
- Students will synthesize knowledge of notes and rhythms in order to repeat and dictate a simple melody
