For young kids, the training may include toileting, dealing with their behavior, how to best help them in school, teaching modalities and other aspects a person diagnosed with autism may have issues with. For older

children and adults with autism, the training may be more emphasized on communication skills, job coaching and other support that are practical outside in society. PASS also hosts support groups to speak

about the troubles of helping their children. PASS provides non-verbal learners that have trouble socializing with iPads that assist them in communicating their thoughts. In addition, the organization holds parties and dances in order to expose the clients to a bustling environment as well as help them build their communication skills.

Students who wish to further assist their cause can partake in Peer Buddies. This commitment involves working with others with special needs of relatively the same age and offering conversations and social interactions.

"Something anybody can do to support someone with autism or any special needs is to just be their friend. It's as simple as that," Mrs. Passaro said.

President Joe Biden introduced Ketanji Brown Jackson on Feb. 25, for a historic nomination for the U.S Supreme Court. If confirmed by the Senate,

With the current state of both the regional and global environment, Turkish foreign policy is being modified to protect its interests concerning international affairs.

Turkey has maintained a policy to establish stable conditions of peace and development with neighboring and distant states. However, recent shifts suggest that Turkey is moving away from the West and becoming more active in the Middle East.

Ankar, Turkey's capital, is becoming increasingly more involved in the affairs of the Middle East to the extent that it has been acting as a third party in regional conflicts.

Specific regions of the Middle East open to these new channels for improving Turkey's diplomacy include Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates

(UAE) and Israel. Turkey has begun to change its positions and restart relations due to external factors, domestic and external issues involving security and the economy.

The decreasing involvement of the U.S. in the current conflicts between Russia and Ukraine has caused Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdoğan to act cautiously towards the West.

"It would be naïve for Turkey to continue with a benign reading of the strategic environment and to seek a policy of neutrality between the warring parties," President Erdoğan said.

The increasingly violent situation with Russia has pushed Turkey, Saudi Arabia, Qatar, Egypt and the UAE towards a de-escalation process.

However, a good balance remains with Libya and Syria, shifting Ankara's Middle East policy to rebalance the region while tensions strain further east.

Russia goes to war against Ukraine, bombs civilians

On Feb. 24. **Russia's** President Vladimir Putin launched an assault on Ukraine.

Putin announced that Russia was intervening as an act of self-defense. He claimed that he was protecting the people of Russia from genocide, that the Russian military is seeking "demilitarization and denazification," not occupation.

Ukraine. On March 4, Russia attacked Europe's largest nuclear

plant, Zaporizhzhia. Russia bombed the southeast side of the facility, despite warnings of the potential nuclear disaster that could occur, starting a fire. The fire was successfully put out and no essential equipment was reported to be damaged, but it is believed that Russia

facility.

Russian troops have also been advancing towards cities Kherson, Mariupol, Kharkiv and Kyiv, Ukraine's capital. Residential areas of Kharkiv, Ukraine's second largest city, were hit with missiles on Feb. 28, killing at least nine and injuring 37. Kherson's residents are also under attack, on March 1, residents were forced to shelter in basements as explosions, gun fire and armored vehicles began to flood the streets.

The aggressions

in Kherson and Mariupol have also caused humanitarian issues. Due to the damage of roads and bridges from the fighting, access to food, clean water and medicine is scarce.

In early March, officials from Ukraine and Russia

now has control over the met to discuss the need of humanitarian corridors, a safe zone for civilians, but they have yet to reach an agreement on a ceasefire altogether.

As of March 10, the estimated number of Ukrainian civilians dead is 516 and injuries are estimated at about 908 according to the United Nations. About two million people have fled the country, thousands of which fled from the country's capital in fear of the city being put under siege. As of March 6, several evacuation attempts have been halted by Russian bombings.

The tensions between Ukraine and Russia began when the Soviet Union broke apart in the early 1990s. That tension then led to the annexation of Crimea, a peninsula along the northern coast of the Black Sea, by Russia in 2014.

Along with the annexation of Crimea, Luhansk and Donetsk, provinces of Ukraine, have been under the control of Russian-backed separatists since 2014. Since 2014, Russia has been striking at Ukraine, leading to the conflict at hand today.

Haitian police open fire on factory protesters

The Haitian Police began to open fire on factory workers who organized a three-day-long peaceful protest in Port-

au-Prince on Feb. 23. Three were wounded from the gunshots, and one journalist died in the hospital from injuries he received in the crossfire.

Hundreds of protesters filled the streets, requesting Prime Minister Ariel Henry to raise the minimum wage again after he initially raised it 54% earlier in the week. The protesters declared the minimum wage needed to be raised in order to match the price of living better.

Protesters from the Port-au-Prince massacre mainly were garment workers

who reported making less than \$7.50 a day. Prime Minister Henry instituted a 37% wage increase for garment workers, half of what Union leaders demanded.

Police fired from a moving vehicle

on the street, which Prime "The government reiterates the Minister responsibility of public authorities Henry later condemned. He insisted that he - Prime Minister Henry will do more to protect peaceful protesters in the

future.

"The government reiterates the responsibility of public authorities to ensure order and security," Prime Minister Henry said.

Haiti's National Police Department did not respond to any requests for comments, so it is not sure why police fired on the protesters in the first place.

On Feb. 15, 15-year-old Russian figure skater Kamila Valieva tested positive for trimetazidine, a drug on the World Anti-Doping Agency's (WADA) list of banned substances.

After leading her team to gold in the team event, her drug test came back positive for a banned heart medication. The Russian Anti-Doping Agency (RUSADA) suspended Valieva a day after her results were public. The Disciplinary Anti-Doping

Committee canceled the suspension to investigate her support personnel.

On Feb. 14, she was officially allowed to participate in the individual women's short program. The day of the competition, Valieva posted the best score in the short program to qualify for the free skate. After numerous falls in the free skate, she took fourth in the individual program.

Many believe Valieva should not have competed in the individual program and the team event. Others claim the adults who are associated with the skater should be held responsible, not Valieva.

"This is a slap in the face to the Olympic Games, to our sport, and to every athlete that's ever competed at the Olympics clean," former Olympic figure skater Johnny Weir said.

Speculation surrounds Princess Diana's death

On the night of Aug. 31, 1997, Princess Diana died in a car accident in the Alma Tunnel, in Paris, France. Some people believe that what happened that night was not only a tragic accident but a successful assassination of a strong female leader.

Though most of the theories surrounding the death of Diana are proved false, it is coincidental that after the death of Diana, Prince Charles quickly remarried Camilla Parker Bowels. A majority of this theory stems from thinking that British intelligence agencies assassinated Diana, who was having an affair with Dodi Al-Fayed, an Egyptian Muslim and son of a billionaire, in order to save the reputation of the royal family.

Rumors were spread that Al-Fayed intended to propose to Diana because she was pregnant. Al-Fayed's father also stated that the royal family did not want the mother to the heir to the throne, Prince William, to be married to a Muslim.

"They [the royal family] could not accept that an Egyptian Muslim could eventually be the stepfather of the future King of England," father of Dodi AlFayed, Mohamed Al-Fayed said.

It was later discovered after the car crash that Diana was not pregnant, and Al-Fayed had never purchased an engagement ring therefore never intended to propose.

Diana herself suspected that her death would occur because of the royal family. In a note to her butler she wrote, "I am sitting here at my desk today in October, longing for someone to hug me and encourage me to keep strong and hold my head high. This particular phase in my life is the most dangerous. [...] is planning 'an accident' in my car, brake failure and serious head injury in order to make the path clear for Charles to marry."

Although the rumors of pregnancy and proposal were false, the suspicion that Diana's death was not an accident is still possible. A former M16 officer stated that he saw assassination plans for a foreign politician in Paris that were "eerily similar" to Diana's deadly car accident. It was then questioned whether the driver, Henri Paul, was feeding information to M16 leading up to the accident.

It was suspected that Paul was led to the tunnel where the crash occurred because M16 intentionally blocked an expected turn on the usual route

Diana took from the Ritz Hotel to her boyfriend's apartment. The chase of poparazzi was thought to be M16 agents assuring that the accident occurred and Diana would be fatally injured and killed.

Little Debbie, the company that produced Cosmic Brownies, wanted a twist from their regular fudge brownies with walnuts on top. They added a galactic theme to the brownie, hence the different colored chocolate chips on top of the two brownies.

Sugar, corn syrup water and enriched bleached flour are the first three ingredients on the back of the package. Looking far down the ingredient list there will be items like polysorbate 80, sodium stearoyl lactylate and sorbic acid.

Those ingredients look unsettling at first, but they are just additives to help enhance the product. Sorbic acid, for example, is an additive for the brownies to preserve freshness in the brownies before they are opened.

Aside from this, Cosmic Brownies are one of the most fattening brownies among the different brownies made by Little Debbie. However, do not let its

pleasant taste fool you, the brownie's saturated fat content is five grams which jumps the sugar count up by 24 grams.
